

REGIMENT OF CITY BOY ON FRONT 105 DAYS; NO RELIEF

Robert Orlando Fish entered the service Dec. 7, 1917, and was assigned to Headquarters Company, 38th Infantry, Third Division; embarked from New York March 28, 1918, and arrived in Brest, France, April 7, 1918; battles, Aisne Defensive, Chateau Thierry, Champagne Marne Defensive, Aisne Marne Offensive, St. Mihiel, Vesle Sector, Meuse Argonne Offensive, Army of Occupation; hospital treatment in Coblenz, scarlet fever and diphtheria; sailed for United States July 27, 1919; discharged Aug. 23, 1919; sergeant first class.

Lorie John Long entered the service July 8, 1918, as second-class fireman, and was assigned to U. S. S. Missouri, transport cruising home waters; discharged Jan. 8, 1919, New York; first-class fireman.

Ray Randle Newman entered the service Nov. 17, 1917, and was assigned to Company 329, Q. M. C., Regular Army, Ft. Thomas, Ky., Florida and Camp Travis, Texas; discharged on March 25, 1918.

Elbert Lee Hale entered the service May 5, 1917, as apprentice seaman; trained at Newport, R. I. Naval Training Station; assigned to U. S. S. battleship Illinois with the North Atlantic Fleet; discharged June 6, 1919, Pittsburgh, Pa.; ooxswain.

George Beam Hunt entered the service June 20, 1918, and was commissioned first lieutenant; assigned to Fourth Battalion, 21st Engineers, Medical Corps; embarked from Hoboken, N. J., Sept. 6, 1918, and arrived in Brest, France, Sept. 21, 1918; battles, Meuse-Argonne Forest; sailed for the United States June 24, 1919, and arrived Hoboken, N. J., July 10, 1919; discharged July 28, 1919; captain.

Gordon Rollo Hale entered the service May 17, 1918, and was assigned to Jefferson Barracks, 27th Company, Non-Con School, Regular Army; discharged Jan. 11, 1919; sergeant; re-enlisted Oct. 15, 1919, Camp Grant, Ill.

Paul King Bryan entered the service Sept. 20, 1917, and was assigned to Company B, 23rd Regiment, 2nd Division, Infantry, Regular Army, embarked from New York June 11, 1918, and arrived in Liverpool, England, June 16, 1918; battles Chateau-Thierry, Soissons, St. Mihiel, Champagne and Argonne; treatment in hospital; wounded in leg by bullet; sailed for United States May 23, 1919, and arrived Hoboken June 9, 1919; discharged June 21, 1919.

Frederick Earl Pickett entered the service May 31, 1918, L. E. R., U. S. N. R. F.; trained at Great Lakes Naval Training Station; assigned to 207th Company, 14th Regiment Old Detachment Camp, after four months transferred to United States Naval Radio School, Cambridge, Mass.; discharged Dec. 20, 1918.

Paul Norris Lyons entered the service Aug. 4, 1917, as fireman, third class, U. S. N.; trained at Newport, R. I., Portsmouth, N. H., Philadelphia, Boston, Norfolk, Va., and New London, Conn.; discharged Jan. 7, 1919, Norfolk, Va.; electrician, Radio, second class.

George Washington Folkner entered the service July 17, 1918, as seaman, and after training at Great Lakes, Ill., was assigned to U. S. S. Illinois, battleship, and later to U. S. S. Bath, cargo; discharged July 30, 1919, Pittsburgh, Pa.; fireman.

Walter Guy Kinsey entered the service 1918 and was assigned to Company A, Second Battalion, U. S.

Guards, San Antonio, Tex., Leavenworth, Kas., and Camp Travis, Tex.; (three years' service, 32nd U. S. Infantry, Philippine Islands, 1899); discharged Feb. 9, 1920.

Webster Bryan Marshall entered the service Dec. 10, 1917, United States Navy, and trained at St. Helena, N. T. S., Berkeley, Va.; discharged Nov. 15, 1918, New York; fireman.

105 Days Without Relief
Lloyd Allen Rust entered the service Aug. 5, 1917, and was assigned to Headquarters Company, 150th F. A., 42nd Division, National Guards; embarked from Hoboken, N. J., Oct. 18, 1917, and arrived in St. Nazaire, France, Oct. 21, 1917; battles, Lunelville sector, Baccarat sector, Champagne defensive, Aisne-Marne offensive, St. Mihiel offensive, minor operations in Woivre, Meuse-Argonne offensive.

His regiment had the record of the longest continuous service on the front, it being 105 days without relief. Two regimental citations from the French. Their artillery brigade, the 67th, was cited by general headquarters as the best in France.

Sailed for United States April 13, 1919, and arrived Hoboken, N. J., on April 25, 1919; discharged May 9, 1919, Camp Taylor, Ky.; sergeant.

Ralph Edward Englebert entered the service May 27, 1918, and was assigned to 323rd Supply Company, Q. M. C.; embarked from Newport News, Va., Aug. 14, 1918, and arrived in Brest, France, Aug. 24, 1918; battles, St. Mihiel; sailed for United States June 27, 1919, and arrived in Hoboken, N. J., July 3, 1919; discharged July 4, 1919; corporal.

James Porter Borroughs entered the service June 8, 1917, and was assigned to Company G, 20th Infantry; transferred to Battery F, 30th Field Artillery, Tenth Division, Regular Army; Ft. Douglas, Utah, and Camp Funston, Kas.; discharged Jan. 29, 1919; sergeant.

William Saunders Price entered the service Sept. 21, 1918, and was assigned to Company C, 161st Dept. Brigade, Infantry, Camp Grant, Ill.; discharged Dec. 1, 1918.

Discharged as Captain.
John Milton Fouts entered the service as captain, July 23, 1918 and was assigned to Casual Company, M. C. Embarkation Hospital No. 1 from Aug. 16, to May 13, 1919—at port of embarkation Hoboken, N. J.; discharged May 13th, 1919, captain.

Daniel Dotz Boswell entered the service Dec. 13, 1917 and was assigned to Cooks and Bakers' School, permanent organization, Regular Army, Camp Funston, Kansas; discharged Dec. 21, 1918, sergeant, First Class.

Clem Hill Ferguson entered the service Aug. 25, 1917 and was assigned to 12th Aero Squadron, Air Service; embarked from Philadelphia, Dec. 4, 1917 and arrived LaHavre, France, Dec. 27, 1917; battles—Marne Defensive, St. Mihiel Offensive, Argonne Offensive; sailed for United States, June 4, 1919 and arrived New York, June 16, 1919; discharged July 2, 1919, sergeant.

Emery Sherman Beardsley entered the service Oct. 4, 1917 and was assigned to Company C, 113th Field Signal Bn. 38th Division; embarked from New York, Oct. 1918 and arrived in Cherbourg, France, Oct. 21, 1918; trained in France; sailed for the

United States, April, 1919 and arrived New York, May, 1919; discharged May 23, 1919, corporal.

Was in 3 Air Raids.
William Estel Fox entered the service and was assigned to Q. M. C.; embarked from Camp Upton, N. Y., July 14th, 1918 and arrived in Liverpool, England, July 26, 1918; trained in France. Battles—3 air raids; sailed for United States, Feb. 12, 1918 and arrived Newport News, Va., Feb. 21, 1918; discharged Nov. 21, 1919.

George Campfield Marvin entered the service March 6, 1918 and was assigned to 50th Aerial Photographic Detachment, Waco, Texas, San Leon, Tex., and Ellington Field, Texas; discharged Feb. 6, 1919, Ellington Field, Texas.

Harold Lowry Hiatt entered the service Jan. 16, 1918 and was assigned to Battery C, Second Battalion French Artillery; embarked from Boston, Mass., March 28, 1918; arrived at Liverpool, England, June 12, 1918; battles—Toul Sector, Oct. 16, 1918 to Nov. 11, 1918; sailed for United States, April 8, 1919 and arrived New York, April 20, 1919, New York; discharged May 10, 1919.

RICHMOND MAN CONFESSES FLOUR THEFT IN ELWOOD
ELWOOD, Ind., April 15.—Ralph Yount, 22 years old, a young married man, who came here a few months ago from Richmond, made a confession, when arraigned in a local court Wednesday on the charge of passing a fraudulent check, which cleared up a theft of flour from a Pennsylvania car here last January. Yount said that he and Melvin Walters, now in the army, unloaded 15 fifty-pound sacks from the car, which later were found by the police in the home of a foreigner, who paid \$17 for them. Yount was placed under bond of \$1,000, and the case will be turned over to the federal authorities. The railroad was under federal control at that time.
