

## BUNTING MUST STAY OUT OF PREBLE CO. FOREVER, IS RULING

EATON, O., April 16.—Upon condition that he remain away forever from Preble county, Judge A. C. Risinger, of common pleas court, has ordered that Enoch Bunting be released from the workhouse at Dayton. Bunting was convicted of obtaining money under false pretense last November and a fine of \$100 and a sentence of 60 days in the workhouse were imposed. Bunting issued a check on a Hoopston, Ill., bank, in which he had no funds, and a merchant at Lewisburg, Preble county, who identified him in cashing the check had to make good the amount.
