Census Statistics

WASHINGTON, April 16.—An increase of 463 per cent in the last 10 years in the population of Muskegon Heights, Mich., announced today by the census bureau, is the largest yet reported in the 1920 census. From a population of 1,600 in 1910 the city has grown to 9,514. The largest increase previously announced was that of Scott's Bluff, Neb., which showed a growth of 295.9 per cent.

Lebanon, Ind., 6,257; increase, 783, or 14.3 per cent.

Tipton, Ind., 4,507; increase, 432, or 10.6 per cent.

Aside from its educational value this presentation offers an opportunity for persons to gain an idea of the customs, costumes, life and humor of the French people during the seventeenth and eighteenth centuries.

Moliere was one of the great French dramatists, and "Le Bourgeois Gentelhomme" is considered one of his best comedies. The dramatist himself played leading part in his plays during the time of Louis XIV.

The leading part in the college presentation will be played by Jacques Monier, a Frenchman, who is a student at Earlham this year. Other parts will be played by advance French students, many of whom have studied the language in France.

The French department of the college extends a cordial invitation to the people of Richmond to avail themselves of this opportunity. Persons wishing to attend are urged to get their reserved seats at the Westcott Pharmacy as soon as possible. Admission will be 50 cents.
