

TWO SUBMARINES SUNK WHILE LOCAL BOY WAS ON SHIP

Edward Wendall Gardner entered the service April 30, 1918, and was assigned to 22nd Engineers, Company D, 1st Division; embarked from Hoboken, July 31, 1918, and arrived in Brest, France, Aug. 12, 1918; battles, St. Mihiel, Belgium, Argonne Forest; gassed; treatment in several hospitals in France; sailed for United States June 4, 1919, and arrived in Hoboken, N. J., June 10, 1919; discharged July 12, 1919, Camp Sherman, Ohio.

Ednor M. Rosseter entered the service June 3, 1917, and was assigned to Squadron A flying cadet, Cincinnati Base Hospital, No. 25, Medical Enlisted Reserve Corps, School of Aeronautics, Ohio State University, and School of Military Aeronautics, Ohio State University; commissioned second lieutenant with rank of reserve military aviator, May 29, 1918; discharged Feb. 6, 1919, Ellington Field, Houston, Texas.

James Isaac McNew entered the service Oct. 4, 1917, and was assigned to 38th Division, Engineer Pontoon Train; embarked July 14, 1918, and arrived South Wales Aug. 1, 1918; battles, Alsace offensive, Aug. 18, 1918, to Oct. 17, 1918; sailed for United States April 18, 1919, and arrived in Hoboken, N. J., April 27, 1919; discharged May 17, 1919, corporal.

Frank Benn entered the service July 22, 1918, seaman, and after training at Great Lakes, Ill., was assigned to U. S. S. DeKalb; embarked from New York City and arrived in Brest, France, from which place he was sent to Plymouth, England, on a destroyer; later became a member of the crew of the U. S. S. Astoria, which visited ports in Scotland, Wales, England, France, Ireland and Portugal; transferred to the U. S. S. Macon and released when he went out of commission at Norfolk, Va.

Claude Mayhew Graber entered the service Jan. 14, 1918, and was assigned to U. S. A. Base Hospital No. 22, Medical Branch; embarked from New York City, 1918, and arrived in Liverpool, England, June 16, 1918; trained in Bordeaux, France; sailed for United States March 17, 1919, and arrived in Hoboken April 2, 1919; discharged April 23, 1919.

Submarines Were Sunk
Charles Lee entered the service Dec. 9, 1917, and was assigned to 26th Aero Squadron, Regular Army; embarked from Boston, Mass., July 14, 1918, and arrived in England Aug. 1, 1918; July 30, 1918, ran into nest of submarines and United States submarine chasers were sunk; sailed for United States Nov. 25, 1918, and arrived in New York, N. Y., Dec. 1, 1918; discharged Dec. 22, 1918, Camp Sherman, Ohio.

Russell Howard Keller entered the service in 1917, was assigned to Battery A, 17th Field Artillery, Second Division, Coast Artillery, Fort Washington, Md.; embarked from Hoboken, N. J., Dec. 12, 1917, and arrived in Brest, France, Dec. 30, 1917; battles, Verdun sector, Chateau Thierry, Soissons, St. Mihiel, Meuse-Argonne; sailed for United States July 8, 1919, and arrived in Newport News, Va., July 24, 1919; discharged Aug. 1, 1919.

Alphonsus Eugene Hipskind entered the service May, 1918, as seaman, and after training at Great Lakes, Ill., and Hampton Roads, Va., was assigned to U. S. S. Arkansas, Sixth Division Naval Forces; last trip Dec. 12, 1918, arriving in New York; released May, 1918, receiving ship at New York, seaman gunner.

Robert Ernst Lawrence entered the service June 14, 1918, and was assigned to Tenth Train Headquarters, Tenth Regiment, Regular Army, Indianapolis, Camp Hancock, Ga., and Camp Funston, Kansas; discharged Feb. 8, 1919, Camp Funston, Kansas.

John William Flagg entered the service June 19, 1917, as seaman, second class, undergraduate student, U. S. N. R. F., and was assigned to Camp Detachment, Camp Dewey, Great Lakes; released Dec. 21, 1919, seaman second class, undergraduate student.

Cyrus Luther Payne entered the service Aug. 23, 1918, and was assigned to Forty-third company, Eleventh Battalion, Depot Brigade, Camp Lee, Virginia; discharged Jan. 6, 1918; as sergeant.

This unit was busily engaged in sending supplies to the front from a supply base; arrived back in United States, July 27, 1919, Hoboken, N. J.; discharged Aug. 4, 1919, corporal.

William Elmer Beske entered the service June 26, 1918 and was assigned to Fifth Company, Second Tr. Bn., 168th Depot Brigade, Camp Sherman, Ohio; discharged July 5, 1918, (disability).

Alvin C. Thornton entered the service Sept. 21, 1917 as private and was assigned to Company F, 151st Regiment, 38th Division; embarked from New York, June 11, 1918 and arrived at Liverpool, England, June 24, 1918; trained in Winchester, England and transferred to 67th Company B, Engineers, sailed for United States, July 3, 1919, arrived July 17, 1919. Discharged

July 24, 1919.
