American Legion

Two state senators living in widely separated parts of Indiana have endorsed the proposed war memorial project in letters to state officials of the American Legion. They are Senator James J. Nejdil of Whiting and Senator C. A. Erskine of Evansville. "I am already on record with the various Legion posts of Lake county as favoring the construction of a state memorial in the form of a suitable building," Senator Nejdil says. Senator Erskine wrote that he approved of the proposal to honor Indiana's sons and daughters by erecting a state war memorial building at Indianapolis.

Members of the American Legion are not in sympathy with the proposal of the ways and means committee of the house of representatives to eliminate from the Legion's adjusted compensation bill three of the optional features, and leave only the cash bonus, according to a flood of telegrams and letters being received at national headquarters. The house committee proposes to eliminate the optional features of home aid, land settlement and vocational training, and give the service men \$1 for each day of service.

Franklin D'Olier, national commander of the Legion, was in Washington Friday to present the substance of the complaints received at national headquarters and to urge on the house committee that the four-fold plan be kept intact.
