## Good Evening

The cookery lady has been almost beside herself for several days, worrying over recipes for a boiled dinner. This is our idea of nothing to become fussed about unless you have to eat your own recipes, which, we understand is not the case, and which probably accounts for the long life and youthful appearance of most newspaper cookery experts.

But having successfully created that pleistocene conglomerate called boiled dinner—known locally in New England as "boiled dinner"—what to do with it? The intelligent method of old Sam Hathaway of Hook Creek seems to be proper. His recipe for planked carp used to be something like this:

Secure a large he carp. Clean it, split from head to tail and lay open on a cedar plank. Pack the ends down with copper tacks. Cover three inches thick with clay and put in a

hot fire for about three hours. The heat of the fire solidifies the clay and imparts a gentle roasting warmth to the carp, as well as keeping in the juices.

When thoroughly cooked, break the clay with a hammer, carefully removing with it the skin of the carp. Remove the copper tacks from the ends and lift the carp from the board with a pie knife. Throw the carp over the fence and eat the board.

Be sure to use a cedar plank, otherwise you'll get splinters in your teeth.

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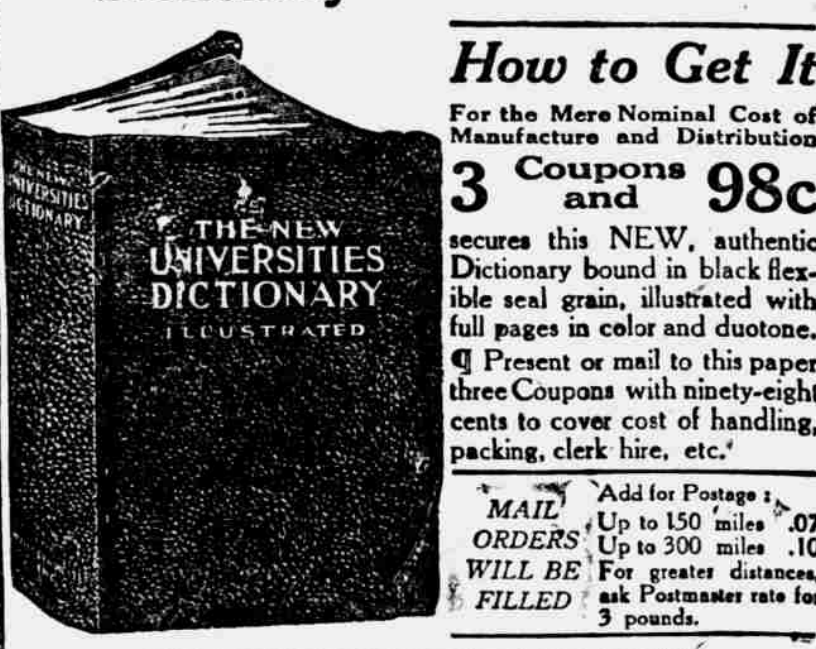


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
