

## SNAPPY SEMI-PRO OUTFIT IN CARDS FOR RICHMOND FANS

"If we can't have Richmond in Class B league, then we'll have a team just as good," said a proud wearer of a booster button Monday.

This seems to be the sentiment of practically all subscribers visited by committees appointed by the Richmond Exhibition company, to return money recently raised for league ball.

The original plan of the Exhibition company was to return the money to subscribers. Tuesday's results showed that only part of the subscribers were reached Monday, yet \$1,360 was in the hands of Exhibition company officials as a fund to finance semi-pro ball here this year and to pay the rent and current expenses of Exhibition park.

Want 'Em To Keep It. Every subscriber visited Monday insisted that at least one-fourth of the total be kept for expenses for this year. The committees would not accept over 15 per cent, however. Several subscribers stated the total sum kept and if individual returned holders demanded their dollar returned, it would be paid by the big spirited subscriber.

Richmond as a whole realizes that it was not the fault of the Exhibition company that no league was organized. Officials of the country spent valuable time and money chasing around in Ohio, Indiana and Michigan in a vain effort to place Richmond in a league that would meet the approval of all.

Now that hopes for a league have become null and void, a substitute high class pro-team is in demand. Every city or town near Richmond is represented by such teams. Richmond had a fair organization last year, yet Wagerstown won the championship of Wayne county.

If present plans materialize, no such thing will happen this year. Richmond will be represented by a team capable of playing such organizations as the Toledo Rail Lights, Norwoods, Christ Church, Newcastle Maxwells, and Dayton Triangles.

The Richmond Exhibition company will either back such a team or else the park will be rented to a private individual. The former plan is considered superior.

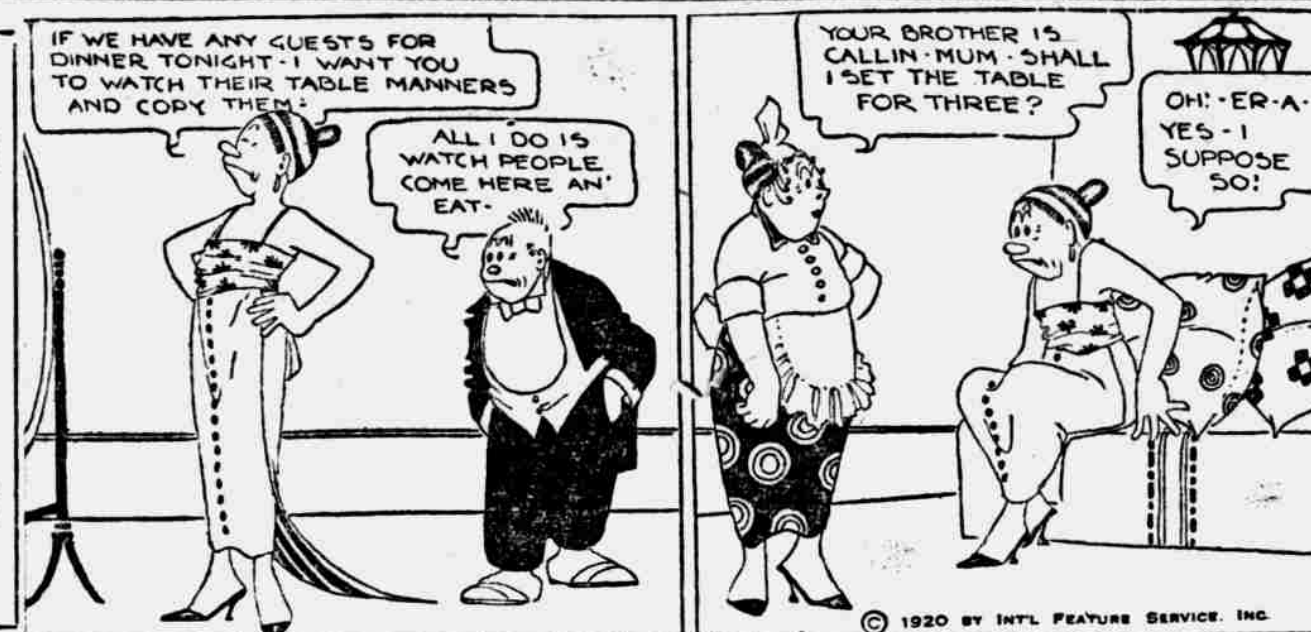

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Some bright day this summer Ray Schalk, premier catcher of the White Sox, will don the old mask and chest protector, work his glove a bit and say, "Atta boy, right there! This one's gonna be good!" There'll be nothing unusual about the proceeding except that Ray and a few fans and the scribes will appreciate the one thousandth game that Ray Schalk will have caught in the big show. He is now within 40 games of that mark.

Schalk stands out as one of the few great catchers of the present day. He has caught over 100 games a season for the White Sox for the last seven years. A Chicago scribe makes the assertion that this is a record. Sounds probable, if not really so. And it's a catch bet that few, if any, catchers have worked in 1,000 big league games. And the fact that Ray has done all his catching for one club, under all kinds of conditions and degrees of success which the club has passed through, shows all the more clearly what a star he is. Schalk was born in Harvard, Ill., August 12, 1892. He broke into the American Association his first year in the pro game, Milwaukee buying him from Taylorville in the I. and M. league, Aug. 12, 1911 (his birthday) for \$700. He was with Milwaukee two seasons when the big league clubs started clamoring for him and the White Sox grabbed him by paying \$17,000 and four players for him. He is one of two stars purchased from the Brewers by the Sox for big sums who made good. Larry Chappell, also obtained from the Milwaukee club at a fancy price, fizzled. Last year Schalk caught 129 games and ranked two points below Hank Severid in the race for fielding honors. He caught 26 more games than did Severid, however, and made but 13 errors in the whole season. He hit .282, a little above his average, although he has always been a timely hitter.

**ELDORADO B. B. PARADE TO PASS THROUGH**  
Present plans indicate that Eldorado is planning regular big league stuff for the opening game of the season at Boston, Indiana, Sunday against the C. & O. team. Earlham won from Cincinnati with apparent ease Saturday afternoon. Coach Mowe announces that all the events were fiercely contested. The marks hung up were considerably better than those of the Indiana-Franklin meet of Saturday.

**Dalton Is Fast**  
Dalton, Quakerdom's best miller, came in second in his favorite event, yet his time was better than the original record. He was but a scant two yards behind Mittendorf. Carter's time in the quarter mile was better than the first place at the Franklin-Indiana meet.

Everyone practically concedes that Carey, Johnson and Ivey will place in the discus throw, shot-put and high jump. Ivey will also make a determined bid for honors in both high and low hurdles.
