

DR. CHARLES F. GRAY FUNERAL SATURDAY; ROSE-RUPE WEDDING

WINCHESTER, Ind., June 19.—Dr. Charles Fremont Gray, 65, is dead at the home of his son, Dr. Fred Gray, in Brown street, following a month's illness of heart trouble. Besides the son and his family, the deceased is survived by one brother, Dr. E. F. Gray.

Dr. Gray was the son of Simon and Nancy Smith Gray, both deceased and was reared on a farm near this city. Since 1876 he has practiced dentistry, in many of the principal cities of the west, spending several months each year, at his beautiful country home, near Winchester. He was an active member of the Friends' church, and was a Mason, Knight Templar and K. of P.

Funeral services in charge of the Knights Templar, will be conducted from the Friends church, Saturday afternoon, at four o'clock, the Rev. Frank Miller, officiating. Burial will be in Fountain Park cemetery.

Allow Appropriations.

Order Wool Sacks Promptly, Members of Pool Asked

Farmers having wool for the Wayne county pool are requested to send orders for sacks to the Greensfork elevator at once, enclosing 75 cents per sack. Orders must be in by noon Wednesday, June 23, as it is intended to buy all the sacks in one order. "Sacks hold 200 pounds, and are to come from Indianapolis. All pooled wool in Wayne county will be handled at the Greensfork elevator, and the work is now to be rushed along," said Theodore Davis.

Farmers are requested not to bring any wool to the elevator until the sacks have arrived, as each farmer's clip will be sacked and marked separately.


