

GRANT TEMPORARY INJUNCTION AGAINST TRANSFER OF SCHOOL

EATON, O., June 23.—Temporary injunction has been granted in common pleas court to J. E. Flora and I. M. Biddinger against the board of education of Preble county transferring certain school territory in Gasper township to Lanier township school district. Flora and Biddinger were required to furnish \$500 bond, pending final disposition of the matter.

Legality of the board's procedure in attempting the transfer is questioned by the complainants, following which a remonstrance was filed. They claim the Lanier township school district "is heavily in debt and practically insolvent" and that by transferring the territory in question the board desires to secure a majority of the tax duplicates for Lanier at the expense of Gasper township district.

Complainants further aver all teachers have been hired and all arrangements made for the next school year in the Gasper township district. The complaint also avers some pupils would have to be hauled a distance of 9 miles if the territory transfer was effected. Flora and Biddinger bring the action as residents and taxpayers of Gasper township school district.

Preble County Could All Ride
If all the motor vehicles in Preble county were touring cars, every man, woman and child in the county could participate in a monster automobile parade, as, according to statistics issued by the state up to June 1, there are 5,020 licensed motor vehicles in the county, which has a population of approximately 26,000, according to the 1910 census.

Recovers From Accident
Clayton Tyrrell, brother of Walter Tyrrell, of Eaton, is confined in a hospital in Washington, C. H., recovering from the effects of a broken leg and other injuries sustained when struck by a railway train, according to advices received here. The message did not give any details of the accident.

Tyrrell was in the employ of Walter Huber, Eaton man, who is constructing a state highway improvement in the vicinity of Washington, C. H. Mr. and Mrs. Walter Tyrrell left Tuesday morning for Washington, C. H., following receipt of the message announcing the mishap that had befallen his brother.

Rusty Factory Building.
Work on the face of the Washington Motor Car corporation is going forward with all possible speed. The concrete work is finished and roofing of the building is under way.

Mrs. Mary Klemmer Dies.
Mrs. Mary Klemmer, widow of the late John Klemmer, of Eaton, died near Middletown, O., where she had been staying the last several months according to advices received here. It is expected the remains will be brought to Eaton for funeral and burial. Her husband died here a year ago. She was a sister of James Knox and Mrs. Isaac Nation, of Eaton.

May Reject Bond Bids.
Two conditional bids were received by the city council this week for \$27,500 worth of bonds authorized issued to secure funds to cover expense of installing a filtration plant in connection with the municipal waterworks system. One bid was from a Cincinnati bonding house and the other from a Cleveland bonding firm. One firm demanded \$600 for printing the bonds. It is understood both bids will be rejected. Each proposed to take the bonds at par.

The board of public affairs will receive sealed bids tonight for the contract for building the filtration plant.

Summer Kindergarten.
Mothers' Council is behind a movement to establish a summer kindergarten in Eaton, which would operate six weeks, with Miss Florence Weber, teacher in the public schools, in charge. The kindergarten would be conducted in the north school building.

Lloyd George

The state of Premier Lloyd George's health undoubtedly is causing anxiety to his friends and colleagues in the British government. Those who have seen him recently declare that he has aged in an amazing way and has lost the peculiar alertness which always had been so striking about him.

The astonishing thing about Lloyd George is that he has stood up so long against a strain of work such as no man has ever been known to face with success, at any rate in the public life of his country.

Ever since he came into office in 1905, his public life has been a succession of the most trying crises and the most stupendous public labors. Fifteen years of such extreme strain could only be borne because one either breaks down or gets inured to such pressure on the mind and nerves, to say nothing of the necessarily sedentary character of the occupation.

Hitherto Lloyd George has shown the needed capacity to detach himself from his work at will and turn from the gravest problems to the lightest entertainment with full relish. But as his responsibilities, instead of growing easier, are becoming more onerous every day the problems he aims to solve are becoming more insoluble at every fresh attempt, as his political future becomes more obscure the hope of success does not afford the relief required to sustain him, so the wearing effects of impending failure and catastrophe are becoming visible.

Lloyd George is fifty-seven years old. He is a Welshman.

Form Dust Mulch

Moisture is supplied by rain or irrigation. The fall of water will often cause the surface to become packed. This allows the water to evaporate and leaves the soil dry with a hard crust.

To relieve this condition the crust must be broken so as to form a dust mulch. This will prevent evaporation. An ordinary garden rake is a good tool to use in keeping the soil in the proper shape, and will also make the ground level and loose.

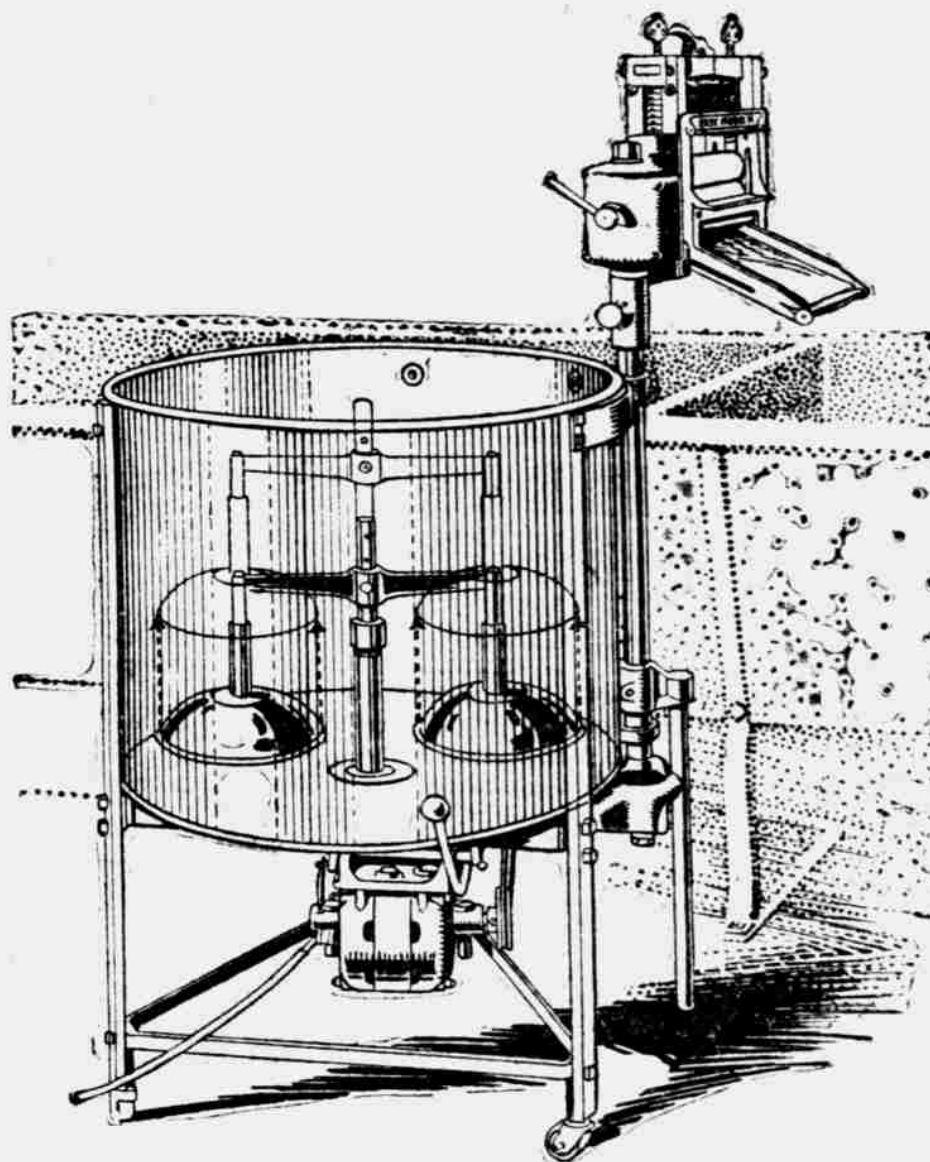

READ! THESE DETAILS OF CONSTRUCTION and OPERATION

PRINCIPLE The "EASY" Vacuum Electric Washer differs radically from other washers, very simple to understand why it operates on the Vacuum or Suction Principle. It is, therefore, and tear, than other washers do. When washer is in operation, the two vacuum cups inside the tub move up and down 60 times per minute, taking a new position on each downward stroke. The air contained in the cups on the down stroke forces the soapy water through the mesh of the garments, while on the up-stroke the cups suck the soapy water back through the mesh. This suction carries with it any foreign substances and dirt lodged in the mesh—it does not in the least injure the damtiest laces, flannels, lingerie, etc.; in fact it preserves them, there being no dragging, rubbing or jerking of the clothes over cleated or corrugated surfaces.

CAPACITY 10 sheets or 14 pounds of dry clothes.

TUB 24 inches in diameter; 18 1/4 inches high. Made of solid copper, highly polished and lacquered. 3/4-inch roll rim edge around the top. Fitted with removable one-piece cover. Tub is absolutely sanitary, having no corrugations or corners to retain impurities from dirty suds; specially finished inside making it easy to keep clean and to prevent discoloring. Bottom of tub is fitted with a discharge valve which can be connected with sewer or open drain and permits emptying of tub in a few minutes. MOTOR Motor is a well-known standard make 1-6 H. P. (Robbins & Myers or General Electric Co.), attached under tub. We equip these washers with countershaft and pulleys in place of motor where washer is to operate from gas engine or line shaft. Motor belt has automatic adjustment to take up any stretch of belt.

GAS HEATER (Shown to right) attaches under tub and maintains water at desired temperature. A great contrivance. Costs extra.

FRAME Entirely constructed of metal, black enameled. All operating parts are under the tub out of the way. All gears guarded with metal shields. Legs are fitted with swivel casters.

WRINGER The wringer swings in any desired position, enabling the operator to wring stops or reverses instantly by means of small lever. Reversible water board can be adjusted to facilitate easy and smooth sliding of clothes over board. Equipped with instant release safety device.

SIMPLICITY It is very simple to operate the "EASY" Vacuum Electric Washer. In six to ten minutes after you have placed the clothes in the water and turned on electric switch, the results will satisfy the most scrupulous housewife who prides herself on the snow-white appearance of her washing. There are only two levers—one stops and starts washer; the other operates wringer—either to start, stop or reverse. Brass knobs on levers.

COST OF OPERATING It costs about one cent per hour for current to wash as much as a good laundress will wash over the washboard in four hours.
