

DOZEN BILLS, ONLY, TO BE CONSIDERED AT SPECIAL SESSION

INDIANAPOLIS, Ind., July 1.—Gov. **Goodrich** will recommend the passage of less than a dozen bills by the special session of the legislature which is to be called soon. This fact has become known to persons in close touch with the situation.

While the governor outlined a larger number of matters in his letter to the members of the assembly last March, yet it is known that he did not favor consideration of the entire program. At the time he explained that the program merely included the subjects that had been called to his attention. At present every one who is riding a pet hobby is preparing a bill for the special session, and in most cases the matters proposed are not of emergency importance. Should all proposed bills be introduced and acted upon the session would last the entire forty days permitted under the constitution. It is believed.

While there has been no meeting of members of the legislature to determine a course of action, there is nevertheless a strong sentiment among the leaders to restrict legislation to the fewest possible matters.

Asks for Caucus
Henry Abrams, a representative from Marion county, yesterday addressed a letter to Charles E. Johnson of Gas City, Republican caucus leader in the house during the 1919 session, asking that a conference of Republican members of the lower body be held the night before the session is convened. From statements that have been made by a number of the most influential members of the majority, a pre-session caucus is desired in order that the members may decide on some definite, business-like program that will insure a smooth running and brief session.

The governor knows rather definitely the humor of virtually all the members of the legislature, as he has received letters from most of them in answer to his communication issued three months ago and has seen a large number of them personally at the state house in the last two weeks. It is believed, therefore, that he is shaping his program to conform with the wishes of the members and that the recommendations in his message will cover virtually all the questions which the legislature will consider.

Governor's Recommendations.
The following matters will be included in the governor's recommendations: Appropriations for state institutions, appropriation for a state war memorial, purchase of a mine and coal cars by the state, amendment of the tax law, amendment of the county unit road law, election law amendments, adjusting rates for legal advertising, increase in interest on bonds to 6 per cent and temporary loans to 7 per cent.

Frank R. Snyder Sustains Severe Injury; Narrowly Escapes Bleeding to Death

OXFORD, Ohio, July 1.—Frank R. Snyder, prominent local photographer, was seriously injured yesterday while pouring acid from a carboy. The vessel fell and broke, cutting Mr. Snyder's right forearm nearly off. The injured man was alone in his place of business at the time and had a narrow escape from bleeding to death before assistance arrived.

Recommends Waterworks Change
R. E. Harrison, of Toledo, expert waterworks engineer, recommends to the village council that the waterworks be moved to a point one mile further north, on Four Mile Creek, and that a filtration reservoir be built. He says the wells in use for 25 years will never be any better, and that the water supply probably will grow smaller. The expense of the removal of the plant is estimated at approximately \$75,000.

Completes Masque.
"Tri-Color" is the title of an anti-Bolshevik masque, just completed by Dr. A. H. Upham, professor of English, Miami university. It will be presented on the campus the latter part of this month by students of the summer school.

Donates \$1,000 Liberty Bond.
A prominent Cincinnati alumnus of Miami university yesterday sent the school authorities a \$1,000 Liberty bond for the endowment fund. The donor refused to permit his name to be made public.

P. O. VACATIONS TO START TODAY; HAVE 17 DAYS

Postmaster C. B. Beck said Thursday that the 1920 Postal Guide would be

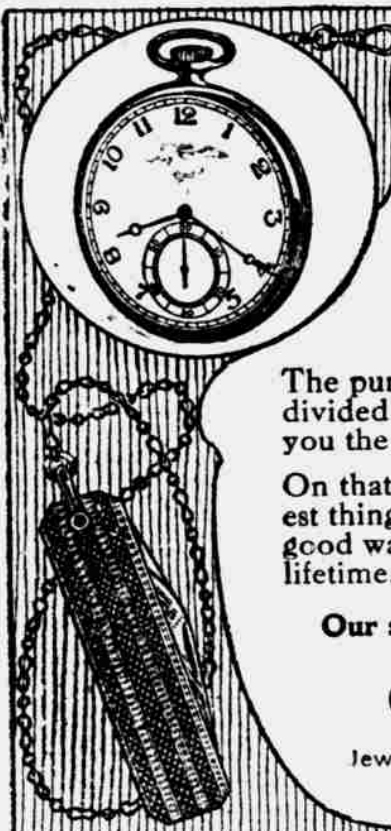
received at the Richmond Postoffice the last of July or first of August. Use of the guide will save time for shippers. The Guide is issued in July. If the

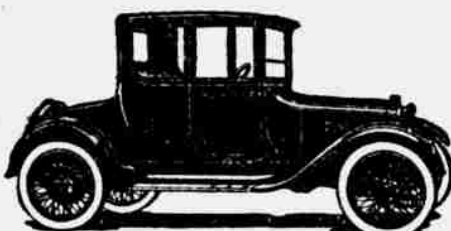

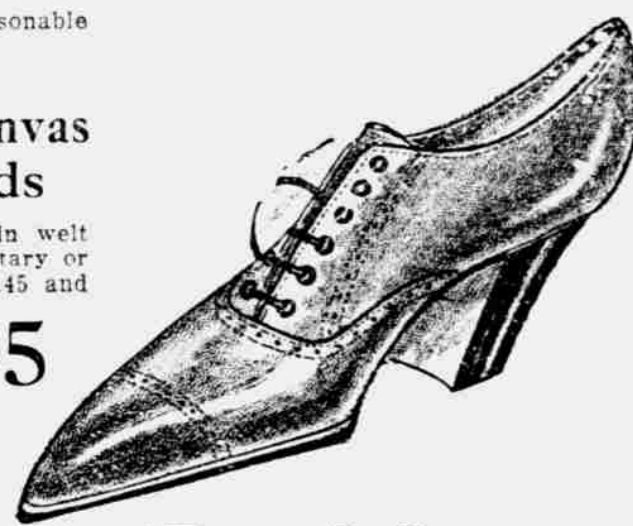
