

## NORTH SIDE MISSION REPORT SHOWS MANY ACTIVITIES PROGRESS; WILL NEED \$10,000

The Rev. and Mrs. J. F. Probst, in charge of the North Fourteenth street Union mission, have submitted a report covering the activities of the mission during the second quarter, April 1 to June 30. Each month speakers and special programs of music are brought before the members many of whom are of foreign birth.

Recently the mission board purchased a new site for the work at North Twelfth and I streets. It is planned to raise funds in the near future for covering the expense of remodeling and modernizing the new buildings and equipment. Those in charge estimate that approximately \$10,000 will be needed. The following report shows the work accomplished during the past few months.

The Union Mission has always stood for the highest ideals in the spiritual, social and intellectual lives of the people. The most prosperous conditions and greatest advancement is found in the homes of the people whose lives are actuated by Christian principles. These principles are upheld in every department of service.

There have been eleven during the past quarter who have definitely decided for Christ. The Sunday morning hour of worship and the evening evangelistic services have been full of interest and enthusiasm to the upbuilding of the kingdom of God.

The interest and attendance of the prayer meetings are very good. The spiritual lives of the people are greatly helped through their opportunities of prayer and testimony, which is a means of expressing our gratitude to God for His rich and boundless blessings and thus helping and encouraging one another. A Bible reading is given at each prayer meeting illustrating the life and principles of a Christian life and applied to life today in a practical way.

The Sunday school interest and attendance is commendable. Its membership is made up of both American and foreign children. The average attendance for the quarter is 88. The various departments have organized classes with efficient teachers furnished by the mission. The junior classes of the elementary division with the secondary and advanced divisions of the Sunday school have their regular class business meetings and socials each month. This is a means of promoting and maintaining a lively Christian enthusiasm among the people in general and is an attractive force to the outsider. The cradle room department has an enrollment of 103 members. This department is visited each month and the Sunday school literature placed in each home. There is generally a small offering contributed to the Sunday school through this channel. The home department has an enrollment of 33 members. The superintendent of this department visits each home during the quarter and in case of sickness or any special need visits the homes whenever needed.

### Children's Day is Feature

"Children's day" was observed the last Sunday evening in June with a splendid program furnished by the Sunday school, composed of special duet, quartet and chorus music; recitations by the children and a closing number entitled "Honest Peggy" given by the senior class. Two of the Earlham college girls came over from the conference and gave readings which pleased and entertained both old and young. The mission was filled with parents and friends of the Sunday school. People were sitting in the windows and standing in the doors.

"The annual "Mothers' day" was observed in May. Rev. Andrew F. Mitchell brought a very touching address on the subject of "Home and Mother". Special music was prepared for this service by the chorus. At the close of this service a middle aged man arose voluntarily, whose heart had been touched by the message, came forward and gave his life to Jesus Christ.

The Bible teacher training class is accomplishing good work. The Bible lessons at the present time include the Old Testament history life surrounding the Sunday school lessons, the geographical setting of the lesson, a course in Biblical spelling and the memorizing of Bible verses (one verse per week) make up the principle study of this class.

"A summer sewing school with a term of 12 weeks was organized in June. The Boston store furnished this sewing school with pug puppies and baby elephants of materials to be cut out, sewed together and stuffed to perfect Mr. Animal. The running stitch, back stitch and over whipping stitch were learned in the making of these interesting animals. Great pleasure and delight has been taken by each member of the school. The Beginners' Class at the present time are making handkerchiefs and sewing quilt patches in blocks.

"The Juniors and Intermediates are making handkerchiefs and underwear for themselves for fall school wear out of materials which they have paid for themselves. Each girl who is old enough will make a dress for herself at the close of the term. Small children will clothe dolls. These children are doing more than learning to sew. The teachers observe the story hour during which time a story is told with a good lesson in every day practical life.

### Sing Songs in Morning.

A half hour is spent in the opening exercises during which time the children sing songs that children love, and turn their young minds and hearts toward sacred things. Each week a verse from the Bible is given, and where it is found, to the children to

**8,000,000 Bottles of "Extra Dry" To Be Auctioned**  
(By Associated Press)

PARIS, July 14.—Eight million bottles of champagne will be among the items on the lists of commodities to be placed on sale January 28, when the sequestered property of Baron Walter de Munn, will be auctioned off. This property was seized in 1915 subsequent to the baron's resumption of German citizenship when the war began.

The number of bottles in the baron's cellars in the vicinity of Rheims, where the sale will take place, was greatly diminished during the war. When General Ludendorff was making his furious drives toward Rheims and Epernay, the wine cellars were used as shelters for the troops, and the men were given almost priceless wine with their meals.

In addition to the bottled wines there are 500,000 litres of wine in casks, these being stored in warehouses, mansions and cottages, as well as secret hiding places beneath vineyards in the Champagne country.
