State Health Board Will Inspect All Barber Shops

Richmond barber shop owners beware! Inspectors of the state board of health were ordered at the quarterly meeting of the board in Indianapolis Wednesday afternoon to begin regular inspections of barber shops throughout the state.

The inspectors were directed to close all shops "which are found in an unsanitary condition, or where it seems possible that disease might be transmitted or promoted."

The order was issued, Dr. John N. Hurty, secretary of the board, said.

Women Voters' League

"The cost of food has risen 21 per cent during the last year; 104 per cent since 1913. The cost of clothing has risen 64 per cent since March, 1919."

These statements are contained in a report by Mrs. Edward P. Costigan, chairman of the committee on food supply and demand, National League of Women Voters. Her statement is supported by that of an economist whose figures are based on Federal income tax returns and government investigations. She quotes him as saying:

"During the three years 1916-1918 the consumer has been paying the food corporation whose reports are available over two and one-half times as large profits as were considered acceptable before the war."

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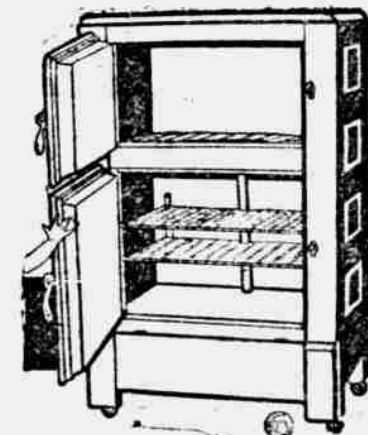

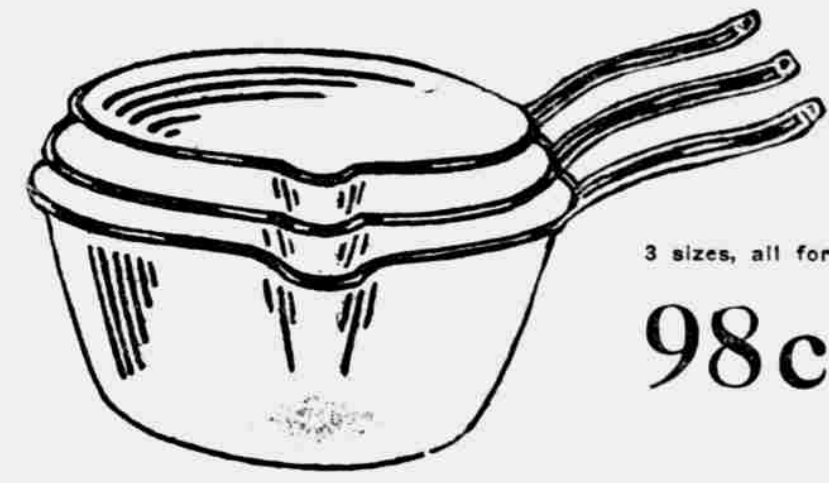
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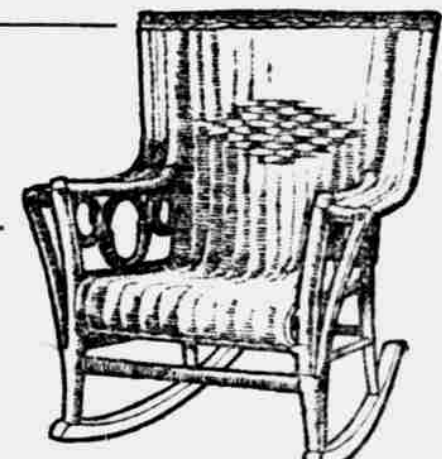
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
