

## \$19,197 IN PREBLE RED CROSS SOCK, IS TREASURER'S REPORT

EATON, O., July 16.—Preble County Red Cross chapter had a net balance of \$19,197.24 at the close of the fiscal year ending June 30, 1920, according to the chapter's annual financial statement, presented by J. E. Parker, chairman; H. H. Hawkins, secretary, and A. J. Hiestand, treasurer.

Receipts for the fiscal year were \$3,013.22 and disbursements totalled \$3,212.86. Balance on hand July 1, 1919, was \$19,386.88, with which receipts of \$3,013.22 for the year made a total of \$22,416.10.

The statement shows the net balance on hand distributed in the branch chapters, as follows: Eaton, \$2,540.51; Eldorado, \$4,017.44; West Manchester, \$1,673.36; Camden, \$691.20; Israel township, \$683.25; Jackson township, \$4,120.02; Jefferson township, \$1,339.15; West Alexandria, \$908.57; Louisburg, \$2,445.50; Gratis, \$427.94; civilian relief department, \$50. The statement places the county chapter membership at about 1,000 at the present time.

### City Gains 84 in Census.

Eaton gained 84 in population in the last 10 years, according to the 1920 census, which gives the population as 3,210, as compared with 3,126 in 1910.

Belief in general was the figures would show an increase of several hundred in population, this belief being based upon the local housing situation, which presents a shortage that is acute. Survey of the situation develops the fact that in many instances houses that would accommodate from four, six, eight and 10 persons are occupied by only one and two persons. This seemingly would explain why the look-for healthy increase in population did not materialize.

### Pickrel Will Speak.

W. G. Pickrel, Dayton, Democratic candidate for nomination for congress from this district, is scheduled to speak here Saturday afternoon in the interest of his candidacy. The meeting will be held in front of the courthouse at 4 o'clock. Mr. Pickrel will speak on "Side-lights of the Frisco Convention."

Five protestant churches in the city will unite the congregations in Sunday evening services during the mid-summer. The first meeting will be held Sunday evening in the Methodist church. Rev. Hiley Baker, pastor of the Christian church, will preach the sermon. Each of the churches will have one of the series of services.

The regular monthly meeting of the Poland China Breeders will be held at the township trustee's office in Centerville on Friday night. All interested in Poland China hogs are invited to be present.



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### Methods for Canning

In canning by the cold pack method the division of home economics, Purdue University, offers the following precautions:

"Canned peas and beans may keep perfectly, but when opened a sour taste and odor are evident. The exact cause for this condition is unknown, but it is believed that this may be due to a number of different micro-organisms. It is thought that temperature plays an important part in bringing about this condition. Some authorities believe that these micro-organisms develop rapidly after the vegetables are gathered. Use only fresh, tender products and work rapidly, especially in canning corn, peas and beans. It is wise to blanch, cold dip and pack only enough of these materials to fill one jar at a time. Each jar should be placed in water bath as soon as packed. When processed the required time, the jars should be cooled rapidly. These vegetables have been canned very satisfactorily and by observing the above suggestions a splendid canned product may be obtained."

"Botulism—Any danger of poisoning from home-canned products can almost entirely be eliminated if directions have been carefully followed. If they have a bad taste or flavor they should not be used. Cooking canned vegetables for ten minutes at the boiling point after opening for use will remove any possible danger."

The following recipes for canning beans and peas have been carefully tested:

#### String or Wax Beans.

Wash and remove ends and strings from freshly gathered beans. Cut or break into small pieces, if desired. Blanch from five to ten minutes, depending on age. Cold dip, pack immediately in jar, add one level teaspoonful of salt and cover to one-fourth inch of top with boiling water. Put on rubber and top and adjust top half or screw top on with thumb and little finger. Sterilize 120 minutes in hot water and move jars, complete sealing and cool. If a fancy pack is desired, do not break beans.

#### Peas.

Peas should be canned immediately after picking.



After picking, blanch from five to ten minutes in boiling water. Cold dip at once, fill tempered jar to within three-fourths of an inch of top. Add one teaspoon salt to quart, fill to within one-fourth inch of top with boiling water. Place new rubber and tighten lid partially, thus allowing for expansion. Place in water bath and process 120 minutes after the water begins to boil. Remove, tighten lid and test it. If, for any reason, the lid must be removed, the can must be placed in the processor and processed for 15 minutes.
