Richmond Girls Warned
To Stay Out of Eaton;
Misconduct Is Charged

EATON, O., July 27.—Lena Grant, 14, and Lena Chambers, 19, both alleged to be of Richmond, Ind., the former residing at 923 South E street, and the latter at 812 North E street, in the Indiana city, were warned Monday by Judge A. C. Ringer in juvenile court to stay away from Eaton.

The girls were taken into court by Chief of Police Willard Anderson, who said he took them to court at the waterworks park. The officers claimed the Grant girl had on one of her previous occasions visited in the park with a boy with whom she had conduct which he had warned her that he had never seen the Chambers girl before.

Judge Ringer especially reprimanded the Grant girl and warned her that if she was brought into court again for a similar reason he would commit her to a state correctional school. He gave the other girl some very wholesome advice.
