

LIBERTY BOY APPEARS AT HOME CHAUTAUQUA; FINANCES ASSURED

LIBERTY, Ind., July 31.—Alva Barnard, son of Mr. and Mrs. Emerson Barnard of Liberty, is traveling with the Red Grenadiers band which appeared on the local chautauqua platform Friday. He is a member of a family of musicians and has been playing with the local Barnard's orchestra for many years. The band gave a concert in the afternoon.

Wallace Bruce Ambary gave the address of the afternoon, using as his subject "Jean Baptiste and His Brethren." The story he presented was about the French Canadian people, giving many of their characteristics and accomplishments.

The Red Grenadiers band gave a grand concert for the evening program and true to their name, gave a lively program of exceptional quality. Each of the 13 members has a good voice.

The Redpath chautauqua, which has been in session here, was "over the top" the second day of the week and a thirty dollar deficit of last year has been taken care of.

A total number of 526 season adult tickets at \$2.00 and war tax each, and 68 junior tickets at \$1.00 and war tax had been sold up to Wednesday evening, making total receipts \$1,100.

The local committee on the former Lincoln contract, which was taken over by the Redpath company, agreed to pay \$1,100 to the company, who in turn conducted all advertising and arrangements. One-half of all cash gate receipts will be turned over to the local committee. At this time it is believed that there will be about \$250 profit this year.

LEWISBURG, W. Va.—Eva May Coning and Byron Schmick were united in marriage at the Lutheran parsonage, Thursday evening, by the pastor, Rev. George F. Dittman.

Mrs. Mary Lanthrop, widow of the late Henry Lanthrop, died Tuesday afternoon about 3:30 o'clock, at the home of her son, John, west of Lewisburg, on the National road. She had been paralyzed for some time, and had not been well since a trip to Colorado last spring.

John Krise, the 15 year old son of D. O. Krise, who lives on the farm formerly owned by S. A. Singer, south-east of Lewisburg, fell from a tree last Friday and crushed his shoulder. The bone of the upper arm was broken off near the joint and the stub end jammed into the shoulder joint. The lad was rushed to Miami Valley's hospital in Leiter and Kramer's ambulance, where he was given surgical attention. The initial operation was not successful, however, and he will undergo another operation the last of the present week. It is likely that Young Krise will be left with a stiff shoulder.

LIBERTY, Ind.—The health of the county was lowered to the average of the summer months in June. The birth rate increased to the highest so far this year. There were 13 births in the county and none in the town of Liberty. Three deaths occurred in the county and none in Liberty. There were three marriages in the county. The season is here when the highest sick list and death list among babies is prevalent. The usual causes for this high rate are mistakes in feeding and hot weather, to which these little patients are so susceptible. Every mother should be unusually careful with bottle-fed babies and see that the bottles and food are sterile. Nursing babies should not be over-clothed. The summer diseases, diarrhea, cholera, and cholera-infantum may be lessened by extraordinary precautions.

HARDING HEARTILY APPROVES E. C. DRIVE

Senator Warren G. Harding, of Marion, Ohio, Republican presidential nominee, has expressed his hearty best wishes for the success of the Earhart campaign through his secretary, George B. Christian, Jr. The letter reads:

"Dear Mr. Edwards:
"Senator Harding has read your favor of the 13th instant advising that Earhart is instituting a campaign in the city of Richmond and Wayne county for \$500,000 to add to her present endowment, which has become absolutely necessary because the present income from your endowments, plus the tuition received, is not adequate to support the college on the level of efficiency that must be maintained."

ANNISTON, Ga., July 31.—Before going to his death on the gallows here Friday for the murder of a street car conductor, Edgar C. Caldwell, a negro, former army sergeant, delivered a 20 minute talk to a crowd of 2,500 persons. He warned against the effects of whiskey, cigarettes, and carrying of firearms.



Woman is Disenfranchised For First Time in History

GARY, Ind., July 31.—Ten years disenfranchisement was included in the sentence imposed upon Mrs. Chaney Thornton by Judge Martin Smith in criminal court at Crown Point, Friday.

It was the first time in criminal annals of Indiana that such a sentence has been passed on a woman. Mrs. Thornton goes to woman's prison at Indianapolis for two to 14 years as accessory in a robbery case.

She is the wife of Will Thornton who is under sentence to die in the electric chair, Nov. 12.
