LUELLA

The first Llew was the king of the Orkneys, who married King Arthur's sister and was the father of Gwalchmai. From this name was formed the masculine Llewelyn of romance. Another Llewelyn came over to Ireland with Richard Strongbow.

History does not record when and where the feminine Luella was formed. It seems merely to have sprung up in England when the need arose for a feminine counterpart to the popular Llewelyn, who rapidly became Lionel under the magic touch of romance and poetry. Luella has had much more vogue in this country than in her native Wales. It is considered rather quaint and old-fashioned nowadays, but it is still in common usage.

What could Lindsey do for any or all varieties, offer me sweeter than this? The answer is simple, for all who have been loved.

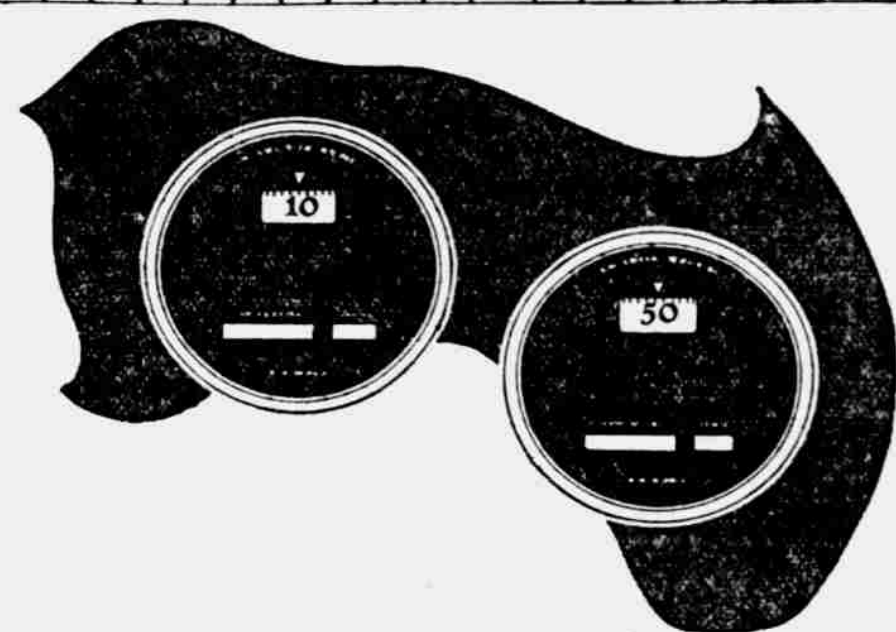
And how I want to be loved—so

I feel radiantly happy tonight. (To be continued.)

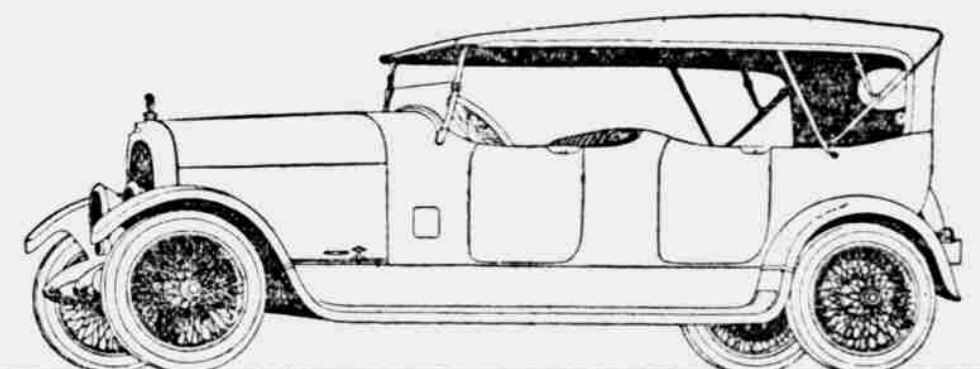
