Authority to issue and sell at not less than par, \$10,000 of serial 6 percent bonds for the purpose of constructing an electric distribution system in Dublin, was handed down by the Public Service commission last week.

The current will be purchased from the T. H. L. and E. Traction company. The construction cost of the electric plant at Dublin is estimated at \$9,700.

It will be necessary to install a transformer, tower and switching equipment estimated to cost \$1,600.

The commission has no authority to approve or disapprove the petitioner's plan to construct the proposed distribution system but has jurisdiction over the issuance of bonds by the town to pay for the plant.

The hearing brought out that the valuation of the taxables of Dublin as of December 31, 1919, is \$523,942, that no bonds are outstanding against the town except approximately \$750 of street bonds and alley improvement bonds which are liens upon the property of the property holders.

The T. H. L. and E. Traction company will be urged to present its bid for the Dublin plant.
