

A. M. E. CHURCHES OF STATE TO MEET IN RICHMOND, SEPT. 15

Bethel African Methodist Episcopal church will entertain the 82d annual Indiana conference of A. M. E. churches, Sept. 15 to 18 inclusive, the Rev. J. L. Craven, pastor of the local church, said Friday.

This conference will include the three Indiana divisions of the A. M. E. church, the Indianapolis, Evansville and Richmond districts. About 61 pastors, 40 supernumerary ministers, 17 evangelists and 6 lay delegates are expected. Bishop L. J. Coppin of Philadelphia, will be present.

Sessions will begin each day at 9 a. m. and continue throughout the day and evening, with the exception of Saturday, Sept. 18. Music will be given at several meetings by the morning and evening choir of the local church.

Wednesday, Sept. 15, 9 a. m.—Annual sermon to be delivered by the Rev. J. M. Nickles, of Muncie, Ind.; reading of annual reports; evening, reception to delegates; address by Cornelius R. Richardson, local lawyer, and by Prof. Hibbs, of this city; talk of Bishop Coppin.

Thursday, Sept. 16—Reports on state of church and conditions of country; afternoon, reports of Sunday school and publication departments of the conference; evening, annual Missionary sermon by the Rev. H. C. Moorman, New Albany.

Friday, Sept. 17—Missionary department, the A. M. E. review, and the Christian Recorder reports; afternoon, report of Woman's Mite Missionary organization, Mrs. G. B. Hill, state president, leading; evening, educational anniversary, sermon by the Rev. Charles S. Williams, of Indianapolis.

Saturday, Sept. 18—Reports of committees. The delegation may visit the grave of Bishop William Paul Quinn at Earlham.

Saturday, Sept. 19—Conference Love Feast at 9 a. m.; preaching services at 10:45 by Bishop Coppin; ordination services; afternoon sermon at 3:00 o'clock; night, sermon; Bishop Coppin will read pastoral appointments.

Indiana Brevities

JEFFERSONVILLE—Domestic consumers are entirely without gas as a result of the closing of the gas plant from lack of coal. Most industrial plants do not use gas and are consequently able to continue operation. A car load of coal is expected soon.

NEW ALBANY—Several persons were injured when a train going 40 miles an hour was derailed by a boulder when emerging from a tunnel, near Georgetown. The engine was derailed and the baggage car turned over on its side. It is thought that the boulder had become dislodged from the tunnel.

HARTFORD CITY—Mabel Morris, 8 years old, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Kunta Morris, of Sheridan, Ind., was almost instantly killed when she fell beneath the wheels of the wagon upon which she had been riding. She lost her balance when reaching for a tree limb over the road. She died before a physician could be secured.

MONTICELLO—Frank Warner, of Wacolet, released from the Indiana colony for the criminal insane at Michigan City, last March, seriously wounded his wife with a knife, and then killed himself by cutting his throat.

ENGLAND TRYING HARD TO SOLVE HOUSING PROBLEM

NEW YORK, Sept. 3—The acute housing shortage faced by many cities in the United States today brought from the Guaranty Trust company a description by its foreign trade bureau of how Great Britain was meeting a similar situation.

"The program of the British ministry of health—complete rehousing in three years—is about one year behind and is costing more than double the original estimate," said the report.

"Local authorities in England are left in charge of the work unless they fail to show results, in which case the business is turned over to the office of works.

"What is keeping back housing at the present time is the fact that there are not enough skilled men to do even a quarter of the work wanted. The trades unions will not allow the number to be increased from the outside.

It is reported that more than 6,000 "fabricated" structures are being built in the United States every month and the demand promises to increase.

Illinois to Hang Twelve Men; Must Be by Pairs

CHICAGO, Sept. 3—All records for legal executions in Cook county and possibly in the state of Illinois, will be broken here October 14 and 15, county officials believe, when 12 men are sentenced to be hanged for murder.

Eight of the men are under sentence to die October 14, and four on the following day. In addition, two other slayers who have been convicted are awaiting sentence, and it is possible that they also may hang on one or the other of the two days.

Chicago has had several wholesale executions in the past—the most notable on November 11, 1887, when four of the Haymarket anarchists were hanged—but nothing in the memory of the jail officials approaches death list of 12 in two days.

Hangings in the Cook county jail take place in the corridor of one of the main cell blocks. There is just

YOU CANNOT VOTE IF YOU DON'T REGISTER!

Saturday of this week is registration day. There will be a place of registration in each precinct in Wayne county. The hours of registration are from 8 a. m. to 9 p. m. There will only be one other opportunity to register, on Oct. 4.

No one can vote at the election in November unless registered. Both men and women are required to register.

Voters may register in any one of the following ways:

1. By appearing in person before the precinct registration board.

2. By mail. When proper registration papers have been sworn to before a notary public or certified to by two voters who reside in the registrant's precinct. It mailed, registration papers should be sent to the county auditor who will deliver them to the proper precinct registration board. The papers must be mailed to the auditor time to be delivered by him to the precinct board on or before the day of registration.

3. By properly filing out registration blank before registration day, swearing to it before a notary, or having it certified to by two voters residing in the registrant's precinct, and placing it in the hands of a voter residing in the registrant's precinct, who must deposit it with the precinct registration board on registration day.

Persons who will be 21 years of age on or before election day to be qualified to vote must register even though under the voting age (21 years) during the registration period.

Any absent voter must be properly

registered in his voting precinct before he can cast a vote.

An absent voter, under the Indiana law, is any qualified elector of the State of Indiana, having duly registered, when such registration is required, who by reason of illness or the nature of his business or other unavoidable cause, is absent or expects to be absent from the county in which he is a qualified voter, on the day of holding any general, special or primary election, or who, because of illness, may be unable to attend the polls.

Any voter who by mistake registers in the wrong precinct on Sept. 4 or who changes his place of residence to another precinct after the September registration day may register in the proper precinct Oct. 4. Provision is made in the new law for annulling his previous registration.

KOREAN PRESIDENT SAYS JAPAN IS TWO-FACED

HONOLULU, T. H., Sept. 3.—Dr. Syngman Rhee, president of the provisional government of Korea, who is spending some weeks in Honolulu, denounces Japan's recent announcement of proposed reforms in Korea as pretense to mislead the western world.

"This official announcement," said Dr. Rhee, "is in harmony with Japanese policy in Korea for the past 10 years, Korea is covered with a screen of Japanese words. Japan shows one face to the western world and a different one to the East."

Koreans, said Dr. Rhee, will not rest until they have attained their complete independence of Japan.

Dr. Rhee referred to announcement July 31 by the governor-general of Korea, Baron Saito, of the imminence of local self-government in Korean communities.


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
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
