

EDUCATE CHILDREN TO AVOID INJURIES, PLEA OF PRINCIPAL

MILWAUKEE, Wis., Sept. 27—Most deaths and injuries caused through public utility accidents can be eliminated by safety education in the public schools, according to Dr. E. George Payne, principal of the Harris Teachers' College, of St. Louis, Mo., and vice-chairman of the educational section of the National Safety Council, who spoke before the ninth annual safety congress today.

The proper training of children in matters of accident prevention exerts a strong influence not only upon them, but reaches and influences their parents, Dr. Payne said. "In the children are properly drilled in safety, the whole population will in a short time be educated in this important matter," he declared, "for the children of today are the adults of tomorrow."

It should be comparatively simple matter to train children to guard against every accident, he said, because there are only a limited number of situations, perhaps thirty in all, in which accidents happen to the public.

Causes of Death.

"In the years 1917, 1918 and 1919, in St. Louis, forty children between the ages of five and sixteen were killed in public utility accidents. In every case, and in about 1,000 similar accidents which did not result fatally,

At least 149 persons will be killed in accidents today. How do we know? The National Safety Council says so. And the Council ought to know, because it has just completed—with the co-operation of the coroners of 210 cities and counties, the secretaries of 35 local safety councils, and the 8000 members of the National Council—compilation of a casualty list for the week of August 22 to 28, inclusive.

This list, prepared for the purpose of analysis at the Ninth Annual Safety Congress which opened at Milwaukee today, presents some rather startling revelations. It shows, for instance, that on different days of the week from five to ten men are killed by accidents for each woman so killed; that three to nine boys are killed in accidents for every girl so killed.

The casualty list for Sunday, August 22, shows 24 deaths caused by drowning, 22 by automobile accidents, 20 by railroad accidents, 12 by falls—of either material or persons, 8 by street cars, 4 by electrocution and 61 by miscellaneous causes. Carelessness on this day took the lives of 104 men, 15 women, 23 boys under 16 years of age and 7 girls under 16 years of age.

there were only four situations involved," Dr. Payne said. "The first was stealing rides on street cars, second, running into the streets while playing and being struck by street cars, third from contact with live wires, generally from grasping dangling wires, and fourth, from playing on railroad tracks.

"In the case of every accident the children were out of direct control of all those who are accustomed to exercise authority over them, teachers, parents and policemen. It is evident

then that the problem is an educational one, and a very simple one. It is a matter of developing control in the children themselves—the development of habits, knowledge and attitudes toward four specific situations."




