

ELMER FACKSON KILLS AMOS CARPENTER; JEALOUS OVER ATTENTION PAID TO WIFE

Amos Carpenter, 29, colored, a laborer, and, it is said, former prize fighter, was shot and almost instantly killed Tuesday evening by Elmer E. Fackson, 29, colored, janitor of a church, while Carpenter and Mrs. Fackson were conversing close to a doorway at 1021 1/2 Main street.

Three bullets, fired at close range, entered Carpenter's head and breast. A few minutes after the shooting, Fackson while walking on South Eleventh street, forcing his wife to accompany him, was taken into custody when Sergeant Coleman leaped upon him from a rapidly driven police automobile.

Coleman disarmed Fackson without any difficulty. Fackson is being held without bail and will be bound over to the grand jury, which is to meet within a few days, on a murder charge. Mrs. Fackson is being held as a material witness.

Few Hear Shots.
The shooting took place while crowds were entering and leaving two theaters, both within a few feet of where the crime was committed. Very few people heard the revolver shots, probably because the shots were fired after the two men had entered the doorway.

Before the murderer had reached the corner of Eleventh and Main streets, dragging his wife with him, Joseph Waltermann, an undertaker, who had heard the revolver reports while standing in the doorway of his establishment, hurried to a telephone and notified police headquarters of the shooting. Sergeant Coleman and Officer Kendall responded to the call immediately in a police machine. Hundreds of people quickly assembled at the scene of the shooting.

Find "Knucks"
Sergeant Coleman stated Wednesday that after Carpenter's body had been taken to an undertaking establishment a heavy pair of "knucks" was found in one of his pockets.

The police say that Carpenter had been attentive to Mrs. Fackson for some time and that Fackson was jealous of him. After his arrest Fackson said, according to the police, that Carpenter had told him recently that he intended to "have" Mrs. Fackson and he advised Fackson to secure a divorce. Fackson said Carpenter told him that unless he took this action he (Carpenter) would get him.

Fackson said he took this threat seriously and armed himself. He said he worked at the church a short time Tuesday evening and then went to meet his wife. He said that when he found her talking with Carpenter he opened fire on him. The Facksons have two children, aged 8 and 6 years.

German Printers Refuse To Set Critical Editorial

ELBERFELD, Germany, Sept. 29.—The composers of the Bergische-Maerkische Zeitung here refused to put an editorial in type in which the editor, under the caption "Sabotaging the Constitution", criticized the methods adopted by the printer's union.

The publisher of the paper notified the typesetters that he could not approve their procedure which he said was tantamount to a censorship exercised by technical employees, and calculated to establish a dangerous precedent for the publishing interests in general. The compositors thereupon walked out.

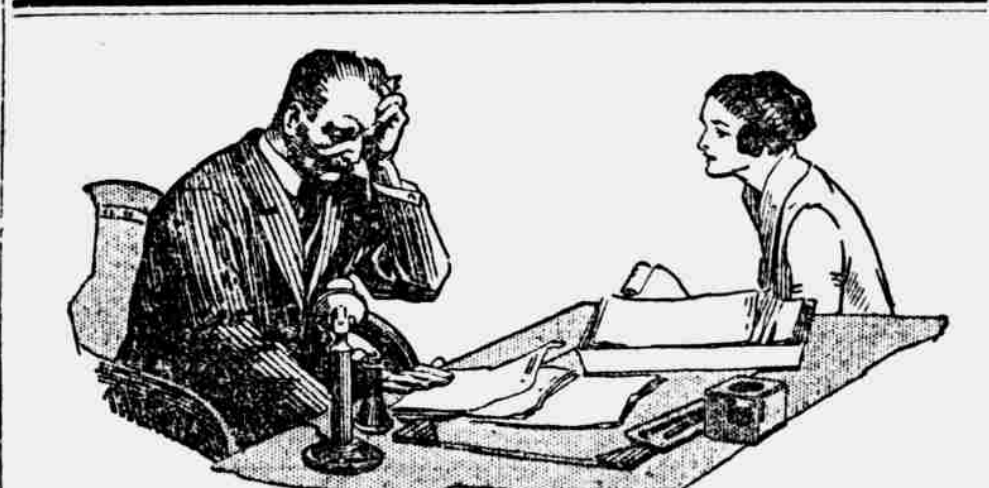
