

IMPORTANT CASES CROWD DOCKET OF U. S. SUPREME COURT

WASHINGTON, Oct. 4.—The United States Supreme Court reconvened today for its regular term to find a docket crowded with important cases. Besides half a dozen anti-trust suits, matters pending included further attacks on the prohibition amendment, suits to test the constitutionality of the anti-protest section of the Food Control Act and of the Federal Farm Loan Act, appeals in the Newberry election case and many others.

With the federal suffrage amendment ratified and proclaimed since the court adjourned early in the summer, court officials expect that cases designed to test the constitutionality of that amendment also will reach the court during the present session.

Lehigh Suits Up.
The first case to be argued at this term will be government appeals in the dissolution suit against the Lehigh Valley Railroad Company, part of the alleged anthracite coal trust. This case is set for tomorrow. By agreement of counsel argument of the other five anti-trust suits will be postponed temporarily.

The prohibition amendment will reach the court again through petitions asking for a reconsideration of the decision of last June 7 sustaining the amendment and portions of the enforcement act, rendered in appeals of Christian Fiegenspan, brewer of Newark, N. J., and George C. Dempsey, a Boston liquor wholesaler. A decision on these petitions is expected within a few weeks. A number of other cases involving interpretations of the enforcement act still are pending and further decision simplifying the court's original opinion are looked for at this term.

Other cases of consequence before the court are those involving the constitutionality of provisions in the 1919 war revenue act levying an excise tax on profits derived from child labor; the boundary dispute between Oklahoma and Texas and the case of the United Shoe Machinery Company, which comes up from proceedings originally instituted by the government in St. Louis under the Clayton act.

American Legion

Walter W. Craig, a second lieutenant of K. Company, Fifty-ninth Infantry, was leading the company into a new position in the Bois de Fay, eight kilometers from Montfaucon on the night of Oct. 4, 1918. The column was surprised by a terrific machine-gun and rifle fire and the men took cover until daylight, when they stormed the machine-gun nest and captured it. The body of Corporal Schmidt, one of Lieut. Craig's men, was found partly stripped of clothing, but no trace of the officer has ever been discovered, although it was supposed at the time that he had probably been wounded and made prisoner by the Germans.

In behalf of the mother of the missing man, Clark Millen, of 44 Oriental street, Newark, N. J., is trying to find out details of his fate from former prisoners of war or anyone else who may have seen or heard of him. This is one of the more than two thousand unsolved mysteries of the war which the American Legion Weekly is endeavoring to clear up. If any reader has any information about Lieut. Craig, he or she is requested to communicate with Mr. Millen at once.

Scientists Deprecate Theory Of New Italian Volcano

ROME, Oct. 4.—Scientists say they do not believe that a new volcano was created on Mount Pisanino, near Spezia, during the earthquakes which began Sept. 7 and continued until Sept. 9, causing the loss of 500 lives.

Tongues of flame and smoke or dust were seen to be emitted from what is popularly supposed to have been a new crater opened near the mountain top. Frank A. Perrett, the American volcanologist for the Carnegie Institution, who occupies a station at Mt. Vesuvius to observe its operations, has expressed to the Associated Press the opinion that no new volcano has been formed but that the earthquakes caused displacements of subterranean strata causing a fissure in the earth's crust and that gas escaping therefrom was mistaken by onlookers as the opening of a new crater. The phenomenon was not a new one. Mr. Perrett said the seismic instruments showed a lowering of the earth level in the earthquake district previous to the tremors. This had been observed on other occasions when earthquakes occurred.

Soviet Opposition Grows In Russia Says Report

COPENHAGEN, Oct. 4.—Reports that a strike movement is rapidly spreading in Russia, resulting in serious disturbances in various parts of the country have been received by the National Tidende from its Helsinki correspondent. He declares travelers from Russia confirm the recent reports that street conflicts had occurred in Petrograd, in which several of the soviet commissioners were killed by a mob. Previous reports had it that six of the commissioners were drowned in the Neva.

Persistent rumors that Leon Trotsky, the war minister, had been wounded, and that General Budenny the noted cavalry leader, was being court-martialed, also were in circulation, the travelers reported.

MAKES ODD CAMPAIGN BET.
NOGALES, Ark., Oct. 4.—What is said to be the first freak election bet in Arizona on the Harding-Cox contest was made here by two residents of Patagonia, a mountain mining camp about twenty-eight miles from here. Dr. H. J. Chenette and Kent Taylor have wagered a trip in a peanut car from Patagonia to Nogales, Sonora, on

the election. If Senator Harding is elected Taylor will push the druggist from Patagonia over the dry mountain road in the car and buy him a drink in Mexico, which could not be legally purchased in the United States. If Cox wins the bet the man will get the same treatment from the druggist.

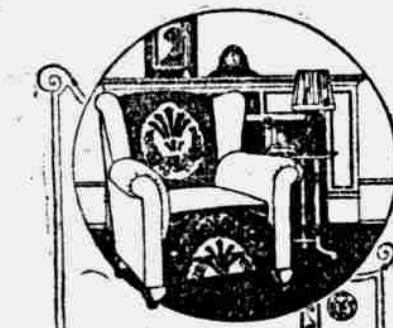

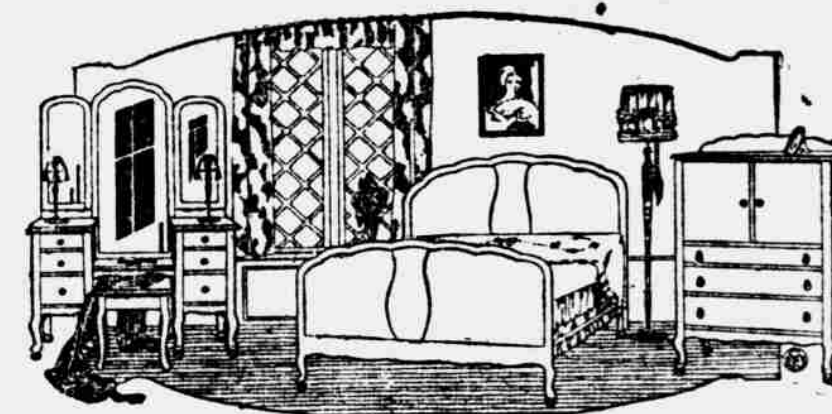

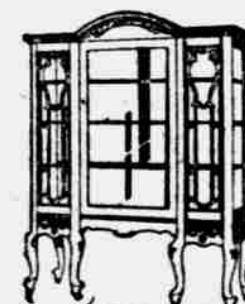
