

POLES ARE VICTORS BECAUSE OF FRENCH HELP, SAYS OFFICIAL

(By Associated Press)

POSEN, Poland, Oct. 6.—An official of the French military mission in Posen has told the Associated Press correspondent that the Polish army would have been conquered by the Bolshevik armies of Russia, if the French had not supported the Poles. This notwithstanding the fact that the Poles beat back the Russians drive on Warsaw.

The French official based his statement upon the belief that the Russian army was superior to the Polish army as an effective fighting machine, with the exception of the German-trained troops of Posen. The Frenchman said he believed the Russian organization has been, and still is, underestimated.

Russ Well Organized.

The official said some Russian units were poorly equipped but it was not true that the army was a "barefoot rabble." He was convinced the majority of the Russian divisions were well-organized units of good fighting men, much better officered than the Poles. The Poles had 25,000 officers but only 5,000 of them ever went to the front although they were sorely needed there, he said. There was evidence that certain Polish companies had fought without officers, he asserted.

An American military officer who had spent a year in Russia and had been under fire at the Polish front told the correspondent he had seen the Poles "plant their artillery in the most ridiculous places, on the exposed sides of hills, and right in the open, when they could have concealed it and made it effective."

Take Turn Retreating.

A neutral aviator who had flown over the front several times when "battles" were said to be in progress, said what he saw of the fighting was "two armies keeping about three hours apart, the Poles retreating when the Russians advanced, and the Russians running when the Poles turned and advanced."

A number of Polish officers with whom the correspondent talked, said they were forced to admit the French saved the day, but the weakness of their officers was explained by the fact that in former years Poles had not been permitted to hold commissions in the army, either in Russian, German, or Austrian Poland, and that the time had been too short to develop a staff of highly trained officers.

Americans Are Amazed at Bands in Belgium

BRUSSELS, Oct. 6.—American visitors to Belgium this summer were greatly struck with the almost incredible number of brass bands marching in the hundreds of street parades, celebrations of one sort or another, which occurred almost daily at Brussels or Antwerp.

In enjoying her first period of peace since the war, Belgium is observing every possible fete day and each of these seems to call out literally scores

of brass bands, each parish or each workmen's organization seeming to have one. Bicycle tourist clubs also have them, mounted on bicycles, and even fishing clubs, off for a Sunday holiday with poles, hook and line, take their musicians along.

One Sunday morning, a day of church fete parades, the correspondent counted 36 bands passing his hotel during the morning.

Spread of Bolshevism Must Be Curbed by Participation in Politics

(By Associated Press) ST. LOUIS, Mo., Oct. 6.—Participation in politics as a civic duty and the necessity for curbing the spread of Bolshevism will be stressed at the annual conventions of the Episcopal Brotherhood of St. Andrew and the Junior Brotherhood of St. Andrew, according to delegates here to attend the opening session tomorrow.

The question of political activity will be confined to the deliberations of the senior body, according to delegates, and an active campaign against radicalism will be launched through the medium of the Junior Brotherhood. Plans for widening the scope of the organizations also will be considered.

The conventions will end Sunday, with a communion service, several joint sessions being held. Representatives of all sections of the United States and Canada are expected to participate.

Edward H. Bonsall, of Philadelphia, is national president of the Brotherhood.

JAPAN APPROVES STATE SUBSIDY ON STEAMER LINES

TOKIO, Oct. 6.—The government bill for the granting of a state subsidy on steamer lines, introduced in the recent session of the Diet, has been approved. The lines to receive a subsidy include the new line to the eastern coast of South America, the new line to Java and Bangkok, with Singapore as the center of the route, the new lines between Shanghai and South China, and the extension line of the South American western coast service.

BULL FIGHTER PEEVISH UNLESS HE GETS EARS

MADRID, Oct. 6.—Civil guards were forced to draw their swords to quell an incipient riot at Sunday's bull fight. The trouble began when an off-

ficial refused to give Luis Freg, the famous Mexican, an ear of one of the animals he had killed.

Freg had been horned by his second bull, receiving a long shallow wound in the abdomen. When he killed the animal he received an ovation and demanded that he be awarded an ear. The official at first refused and the spectators surged into the ring. To keep peace, the official finally gave Freg the ear.


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
