

## LOCAL AUTO DEALERS TO ATTEND CONCLAVE

Clem McConaha, Richmond auto dealer, represented this city at the first general conference of leading officials of the automobile and automobile equipment industry held at Indianapolis this week. The general convention of the Automobile Trade Association will be held at Indianapolis Nov. 4 and 5. Practically all of the local dealers are expected to attend the convention.

Speakers of national reputation will address the dealers, who were instructed to invite their bankers to be guests. Among the most widely known of the national speakers will be Harry G. Mook, manager of the National Automobile Dealers' association, St. Louis; P. E. Chamberlain of Denver, who will speak on "Selling Service Intelligently"; A. R. Kroh, "The Relationship of the Banker and Farmer to the Automobile Industry," and Capt. Robert E. Lee of St. Louis, who will be the chief speaker at the banquet at the Claypool the evening of Nov. 4.

It is expected that at least 500 dealers in all branches of the trade will be present at the convention. The coming meeting will be the first in the history of the state which in recent years has assumed a position close to the top in numbers and volume of business transacted, there being by actual count 2,168 firms engaged in the business. All dealers, members or non-members of local associations are invited to the state convention.

## American Legion

INDIANAPOLIS, Ind., Oct. 28.—The administrative machinery of the American Legion will be thrown wholeheartedly behind a national move to build up the Women's Auxiliary of the legion, F. W. Galbraith, Jr., nation commander of the legion announced.

A national convention of the Auxiliary will be held probably next spring, at which time the Auxiliary will assume charge of its own affairs, and as far as administration goes, become virtually an independent body.

"All doubts and misgivings in regard to the future of the Women's Auxiliary of the American Legion were removed and a system or orderly expansion in state departments and a national organization was provided for by the Cleveland convention," said Mr. Galbraith. "We propose to offer the aid of our organization in building up the auxiliary, but we are not going to meddle with its policies so long as our recognized ideals and purposes are carried out. The Cleveland convention voted to let the women swim without water wings. It authorized state executive committees of the legion to call state conventions and to establish department organizations of the auxiliary, killing the rule which made necessary the establishment of a total of units equivalent to 50 per cent of the number of posts in the department."

"The convention resolution also permits the holding of a national convention when the auxiliary is established in ten states. The proposed national convention was authorized to change the name of the auxiliary and to broaden its eligibility clause, and the legion agreed to amend its constitution to that effect. I believe that the Women's Auxiliary is one of the greatest potential forces for good in this country, and I shall see that the

legion backs it to the limit."

The Women's Auxiliary, which includes mothers' wives, sisters and daughters of Legion members who died in the service, already has organized 1,362 units in 46 states and a number of foreign countries.

## War Office Investigating New Japanese Religion

TOKIO, Oct. 28.—Japan's new religion, Omoto-kyo, which was founded by a peasant woman, and which is popularly supposed to be spreading socialistic and even bolshevist ideas under the cloak of loyalty to the Japanese imperial house, is now finding adherents in the army, according to vernacular newspapers.

The fact that some officers on the reserve list are devoted followers of Omoto-kyo, is said to be particularly disturbing to the military authorities. An investigation was started when

a soldier in a regiment at Nagoya tried to organize in co-operation with socialist agitators, both inside and outside the regiment, an association to oppose military discipline.

In an interview with the Yomiuri Shimbun, Major General Nagasaki expressed regret at the signs of unrest among the troops, but said that the number of men who exhibit such signs

were few. He added: "However, it appears that the number is growing among both the men and officers, mostly those upon the reserve list, who are becoming tainted with the hideous doctrine of the Omoto-kyo. The war office is apparently conducting an investigation into this and possibly some official instructions will be issued in the near future."

## GERMANY DUMPS GOODS
