

## INCLUDE MORE ROADS FOR HIGHWAY SYSTEM IN PROGRAM OF 1921

INDIANAPOLIS, Nov. 3.—Inclusion of more roads in the state highway system and a highway improvement program for 1921 will receive consideration at a meeting of the state highway commission will hold Thursday at Indianapolis at 10 a. m. The commission will confer with Governor Goodrich on a number of roads it has designated as parts of the system, but which the Governor has not yet approved.

L. H. Wright, director of the highway department, will recommend that the commission include approximately seventy-seven miles more of roads in the system. The roads and their approximate lengths are: Road from Shouls to West Baden, sixteen miles; Washington to Elizora, over Newberry bridge to connect with Route 12, east of Lyons, twenty-five miles; Linton to Sullivan, sixteen miles; Lebanon to Westfield, sixteen miles; Elkhart to Michigan state line, just south of Edwardsburg, four miles.

### To Take Up Federal Money.

Mr. Wright said the commission must pave 120 miles of roads next year in order to take up federal aid money that will be available no longer than next year. He said the commission likely will pave approximately fifteen miles of the Michigan road from South Bend to the Marshall county line and the approximately thirty-eight miles of uncompleted parts of the National road in Clay, Putnam, Hendricks and Vigo counties. This Mr. Wright said would practically complete the paving of the National road from Indianapolis through Terre Haute to the Illinois state line.

The paving of about twenty-eight miles of the National road in Hancock and Henry counties, Mr. Wright said, would practically complete the paving of the road from the Ohio state line through Richmond, Indianapolis and Terre Haute to the Illinois line. In order to have one thoroughfare through the state from north to south, Mr. Wright advocates the early paving of about twenty-five miles between Indianapolis and Kokomo and of forty miles between Seymour and New Albany.

**From Michigan State Line.**  
With these improvements, Mr. Wright said, the state would have a splendid highway from the Michigan state line through South Bend, to Ro-

**cheater on the Michigan road and from there over the Range line road through Peru and Kokomo to Indianapolis and thence over the Jackson highway through Franklin, Columbus, Seymour to New Albany and Jeffersonville on the Kentucky state line. Mr. Wright said that the other parts of the route either are paved or are good gravel roads with plenty of gravel near the maintenance.**

The roads designated by the commission for inclusion in the system but not approved by the Governor are the Yellowstone trail from Plymouth to Vandalia; road from Argos through Culver, North Judson, San Blerie to connect with Route 8 near Demotte, and the road from Nashville to Bloomfield.

**THRONE GOES BEGGING**

The newspaper says that the reply of Prince Paul of Greece to the Greek government's offer of the throne to him will be decided if Premier Venizelos retains power, which is regarded as certain.
