

REAPPORTIONMENT IS TASK FOR ASSEMBLY AT JANUARY SESSION

INDIANAPOLIS, Nov. 9.—Reapportionment of the ninety-two counties of the state will be one of the big tasks facing the approaching session of the General Assembly, which convenes next January.

Under the provisions of the state constitution, the 100 members of the House and the fifty members of the Senate are distributed among the counties every six years on the basis of the number of male voters. A constitutional amendment will be introduced including women voters in the enumeration. The reapportionment made at this session of the legislature will be on the basis of an enumeration of voters made in 1919.

Figures showing the fractional number of representatives and senators each county will be entitled to under the new distribution have been prepared by Charles Kettleborough, director of the legislative reference bureau, for use in the state auditor's office. Counties having less than the required number of voters are also entitled to joint representation for fractional numbers of voters over their full representation.

Marion Gains Representative.
Under the new apportionment, Marion county will gain one representative, increasing the county's delegation from ten to eleven. It is possible, also, that Marion county will have a joint representative with some other county. Lake county will have one more representative, making the county delegation in the lower House five instead of four. Lake county also has a joint representative now and it is expected that this additional representation will be held by the county.

Marion county will probably not gain another senator, the present senatorial representation of four senators and one joint senator appearing likely of continuation under the new apportionment.

St. Joseph county made a big gain, but whether the figures will entitle the county to larger representation probably will depend on the action of the Legislature. Other counties showing big gains are Madison, Vigo and Howard. These counties may receive additional joint representation in the new allotment.

Six counties appear likely to lose representatives—Clinton, Grant, Kosciusko, Lawrence, Randolph and Shelby. Substantial decreases are recorded in these counties and present full representation may be reduced to joint representation with neighboring counties.

May Fight Apportionment.
The reapportionment undoubtedly will be the center of a big fight in the Legislature. The loss of representation in the General Assembly is regarded as a severe blow to "home pride" and efforts will be made by the backward counties to shift the losses to other districts of the state. It is believed, Special committees on the apportionment will handle the question for both branches of the legislature.

Wayne Purdue Students
Subscribe to Memorial
Wayne county students of Purdue university have been the first county group to subscribe 100 percent to the Purdue union endowment for a student war-memorial building. The Purdue union has been organized at Purdue university to secure a student building which will be an adequate memorial to the 4,000 men and women of Purdue who served their country in the World war. The building is to be equipped with recreative and social facilities and will supply the need of the university for a proper headquarters for returning alumni.

U. S. ASKS EARLY REVIEW
OF VICTOR BERGER CASE
WASHINGTON, Nov. 9.—The government Monday requested the supreme court to advance for early hearing the case of Victor Berger, convicted of having violated the espionage act.

Twice elected to congress, Berger was denied a seat once before and once since his conviction. Solicitor General Frieson, who filed the motion to advance, said it was of great importance that the government have an early ruling for the guidance of district judges in similar cases.

Teach School Children
How to Preserve Fruit
PHILADELPHIA, Nov. 9.—The art of making Philadelphia scrapple, chowchow, chili sauce and of preserving fruit is now taught here in the public schools.

Instructors in the domestic science department have asked pupils to bring part of their mothers' canning and preserving utensils to school. The youngsters are being taught the best methods of preserving.

Other innovations introduced in the local schools in an effort to train girls for home-making are:

Little Mothers' Classes, under supervision of the Child Federation.
Grocery stores in some schools to teach arithmetic and economy in buying.
Millinery and dressmaking in the Girls' Trade school.
School cafeterias with domestic science classes.

In the Little Mothers' Classes the pupils when they cannot borrow a real baby from one of the mothers in the neighborhood, practice on dolls as large as an average infant. They are taught how to wash and dress the baby and instructed in health rules for its care. Many of the small pupils in the congested districts of the city bring their own wards for the class to "mother."

Irish Hunger Strikers
In Precarious Plight

CORK, Nov. 9.—Reports from the Cork jail today described the conditions of the nine remaining Irish hunger strikers there as precarious. Although this was the nineteenth day of their strike, the emaciated prisoners were declared to be still determined to refuse food. There were originally eleven of the Cork hunger strikers, but one of them, Michael Fitzgerald, died Oct. 17, and another, Joseph Murphy, on Oct. 25, within a few hours of the death of Lord Mayor MacSwiney of Cork in the Brixton prison on the seventy-third day of his hunger strike.

CANNERS FOUND GUILTY
OF MISBRANDING BEANS
LOUISVILLE, Ky., Nov. 9.—The Van Camp, Morgan, Indiana and a number of other canning companies were found guilty of misbranding imported red kidney beans by a jury in a federal court here Monday. The case is the first of many instigated by the government against several scores of canning companies of the United States. In the case here, it was said that 90 per cent of the beans labeled as native red kidney beans are imported.

RISKS LIFE FOR CLOTHES.
PLYMOUTH, Eng., Nov. 9.—Boatwain Butcher of West Virginia was saved recently when the French sailing vessel Yvonne, from Jamaica for Havre, was wrecked off the Plymouth breakwater.

Fearing to lose his best suit of clothes, Butcher changed before leaving the wreck, declaring if he reached shore he wanted them, and if drowned it didn't matter.

The husking rolls caught his glove, drawing his hand into the machine.

He was taken to the Reid hospital, where his hand was found to be so badly mangled that the fingers were amputated.

Proclamation is Issued For Armistice Day Event
