

WINCHESTER WOMAN SERIOUSLY BURNED IN SUICIDE ATTEMPT

WINCHESTER, Ind., Nov. 10.—Mrs. Elwood Laisure, 55 years old, is in a critical condition and will probably die from the effects of burns received when she attempted to take her life today. Early Monday morning she arose and went down stairs clad in her night clothes, which she saturated with kerosene and then set on fire. Her husband hearing a commotion in the kitchen ran down stairs and attempted to smother the flames and was himself painfully burned. Mrs. Laisure has been in ill health for over a year.
