

MINISTER TO SIAM TELLS OF RECEPTION BY GREAT PAGEANT

PHOENIX, ARIZ., Nov. 16.—A colorful pageant attends the presentation of a foreign diplomat to the King of Siam, according to a letter received here from G. W. P. Hunt, United States minister to Siam, who described his own presentation September 6, last. The American minister said he was one of 47 Americans in Bangkok, a city of 800,000. Of his presentation at the royal palace he wrote:

"We started across an immense paved court to the royal entrance. There was a fanfare of trumpets and two bodies of household troops stood at attention. The royal colors were displayed and with uncovered heads we passed on to the stone staircase which for the occasion was laid with a heavy red plush carpeting. Along each side were stationed guards with ancient looking halberds."

"We were ushered into a large room. Our hats were left on a table. Then we turned to the right, mounted a few more stairs and came into another long room with lofty windows along one side. Between the windows were niches in which stood knights in armor (without the knights themselves of course.) Along the other side of this long room or passage there was a row of beautiful marble pillars and beyond them a large room. At the end of the corridor stood nine chamberlains, rather great nobles, resplendent in rich dress and ablaze with orders on their breasts."

"Suddenly, folding doors opened as if by unseen hands and I walked into the presence of the only despot monarch I read of in this world. And as if befitting the reception of an envoy from the greatest republic on earth, he was dressed very simply in a long frock coat."

"The Prince D, who is at the head of the foreign office, presented me and retired to the rear of the room while I read to the king, as etiquette requires, my brief speech and he replied in Siamese in like manner."

"When this ceremony was done, he smiled and we sat down and had our little talk, for the king, you should know, speaks perfect English. He is short of stature, like all Siamese, is quite plump, and impresses one as being a real chap."

Germans Claim Discovery Of Artificial Diamonds

AMSTERDAM, Nov. 15.—Henry Polak, president of the Dutch Diamond Workers' union, says it is not impossible that a German explosives firm has discovered how to manufacture diamonds, as it claims to have done. The chief difficulty is to obtain an unobtainable powerful pressure under the right circumstances, M. Polak explained. Since it is a manufacturer of explosives which is reported to have discovered the method of making diamonds, he said it was possible that experimenters had succeeded in obtaining the desired pressure.

M. Polak expressed some doubt as to whether diamonds could be manufactured at less than the cost of mining them.

Education in Spain Belongs to Rich People

MADRID, Nov. 16.—Education in Spain continues to be a privilege of the people of fortune, declares the newspaper, *La Libertad*. This was evoked by the announcement that the present cabinet had stopped the first effort to open universities to the poor, by annulling an appropriation of 200,000 pesetas by a previous Liberal cabinet to furnish scholarships for needy students in the higher schools.

The writer endeavors to show in the newspaper that universities are occupied largely by students who have no desire for knowledge, or who are capable of acquiring it while pupils of exceptional talent in the lower schools are unable to gain admission to the universities because of the cost of education and are compelled to work in the factories. The paper points out that in this way the intellect of these bright students is being lost to the Spanish nation.

Labor Officials Will Meet To Discuss Legislation

TOPEKA, Kan., Nov. 15.—The 1921 convention of the Association of Governmental Labor Officials of the United States and Canada will be held in New Orleans, May 25, Miss Lina Bessette, secretary of the association, announced here.

The association is made up of officials of state and federal labor bureaus and industrial commissions. It has for its purpose the promotion of better protective legislation for both employers and employees.

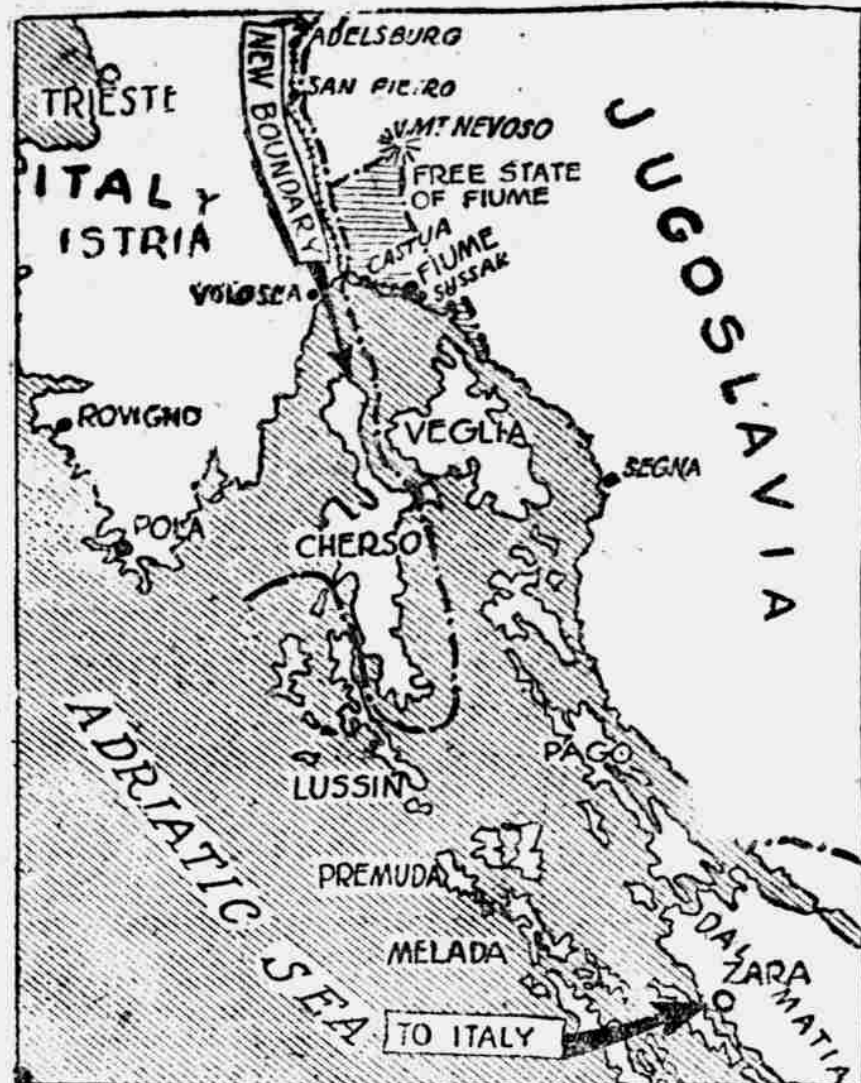

SETTLING THE ADRIATIC DISPUTE



Arrows and dotted lines indicate main points in settlement.

The settlement of the Adriatic problem by Italy and Yugoslavia, agreed to at Rapallo recently, makes the following dispositions of territory, according to a state department announcement:

"With the exception of Zara and Cherso, which go to Italy, Yugoslavia obtains Dalmatia, including Sebenico. The new frontier assigns Istria, Adelsburg, and San Pietro to Italy and runs through Monte Nevoso to the Adriatic, which it touches between Volosca and Castua—the latter being given to Fiume. The Istrian line of frontier is to be contiguous with the independent state of Fiume. The railway from Fiume to San Pietro is assigned to Italy. The country south of Monte Nevoso is divided between Yugoslavia and Fiume, on a basis whereby the higher altitudes go to Yugoslavia and the lower altitudes to Fiume. Yugoslavia also will get Longatico and the adjacent valley."

Egyptian Women Interested In Schools, Public Affairs

LONDON, Nov. 16.—Egyptian women are at last beginning to take an interest in public affairs, particularly in the schools. Viscount Milner in his report as High Commissioner of Egypt, says that no change which has taken place in that country in the last few years none is more striking than the awakening interest of women in affairs outside of the home.

The commissioner added that a few years ago it was rare to find a mother showing a direct personal interest in the welfare of her daughter at school. All this was left to the father, who often had to overcome the mother's opposition to the education of her daughter. "During the last few years these conditions have changed in the larger towns where mothers now visit the schools and discuss their daughter's progress with the head teacher," said the report.

This change is attributed by the High Commissioner largely to education and he predicts that its influence will be potent on the future progress of educational development in Egypt.

AMATEUR ATHLETIC CONFERENCE OPENS

NEW ORLEANS, Nov. 16.—The final report of Gus Kirby, president of the American Olympic committee on the Olympic games and the awarding of various 1921 athletic meets were the subjects of greatest interest before the Amateur Athletic Union when it began its business sessions here Monday. Fifty delegates representing all sections of the country attended the opening of the convention yesterday when it was voted to award the 1921 national track and field championship meet to Los Angeles. Three candidates are in the field to succeed Samuel J. Dallas, of Philadelphia, as president and a lively fight was predicted. The eastern division is backed by the American Athletic Union, the western associations are supporting Robert S. Weaver, of Los Angeles, and the southern association has put forward Harry W. Fitzpatrick, of this city.

Find Unknown Piece Of Gutenberg Printing

The discovery of a fine and unknown fragment of Gutenberg printing (1450) is announced by the Bookman's Journal, the only other specimen, smaller and less complete, being in the British Museum. This fragment had obviously at one time been part of the lining of a large binding, which raises the suggestion that further finds of a similar sort might be made by the use of the X-ray.

WIDOW FOUND DEAD IN NEW PARIS HOME; PNEUMONIA IS CAUSE

EATON, O., Nov. 16.—Mrs. Mary E. Beelman, 85, widow, was found dead Monday morning in her home in New Paris, where she lived alone. Death resulted from "pneumonia and a bad heart," according to Coroner Treffinger, who was called to view the body.

Mrs. Beelman was the widow of the late Samuel Beelman, for many years a merchant of New Paris. She lived the greater part of her life in New Paris. One brother, Dr. C. M. Wilcox, of New Paris, survives.

Arrangements for the funeral have not been announced, but it probably will take place Wednesday.

Rabbit Season Opens
Scores of local sportsmen invaded fields and woods of Preble county Monday, the first day of the open season for rabbit hunting. Quite a few sportsmen reported bags of 10 "cottontails," the limit for one day. The rabbit crop this season is large hereabouts, hunters report.

County Clerk V. O. Hookstool issued 60 hunting licenses Saturday. Since the first day of November he has issued a total of 105 hunting permits. A few permits were issued Monday.

Thus far no hunting accidents of a serious nature have been reported.

Leiter-Gilbert Suit Ends
Compromise was effected Monday in a common pleas court action instituted by Hattie E. S. Leiter against Edward E. Gilbert, and the case was dismissed without record at the cost of the defendant. The suit had been long pending and involved a \$200 note, secured by a chattel mortgage. Gilbert filed a counter claim for \$150. The suit was a tenant on the plaintiff's farm in Jackson township.

Officials File Accounts
Statements have been filed by the various county officials with the county commissioners setting forth the amounts of money necessary to be extended for deputy, clerk and assistant hire the coming year. It is expected the requests will be acted upon at an early date. Action by the commissioners is governed by a state statute, which provides that sums of money set off for hire of deputies, etc., shall be based upon a certain per cent of the annual fees of each office. Any additional amount required must be obtained through common pleas court.

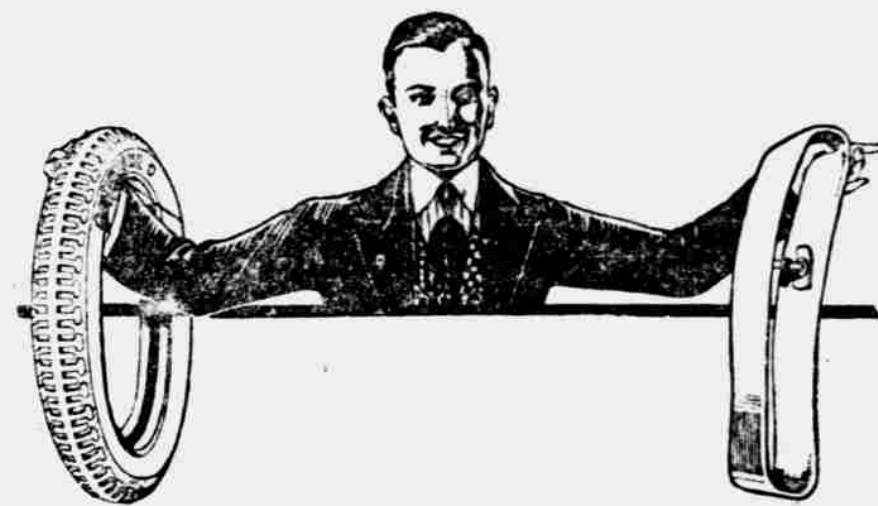
