

UNDERGROUND PARTY, UNITED COMMUNISTS, IS FIRST IN HISTORY

(By Associated Press) CHICAGO, Nov. 22.—The first "underground party" that the United States has ever seen is now believed to be operating, according to J. Brennan, division superintendent of the Bureau of Investigation of the Department of Justice here.

"It appears," he said, "that the members or a great majority of them of the Communist parties have gone over to a United Communist Party that seems to be maintaining a secrecy never before attempted by an American radical organization."

"These people appear to be holding meetings with the utmost secrecy with which they can surround them. Names used appear fictitious."

"The Russian element which formed the backbone of the original Communist Party appears to be in control and to have the bulk of the membership of the new secret organization."

Literature is frequently distributed without any indication as to where it comes from. In order to escape detection, it appears that the party members take unusual precautions. The members are known among themselves and literature is passed around among them, sometimes by messenger. When mailed, we know that it is done in small quantities, three or four letters or packages in a box in one corner of a city and three or four in a box in another section.

"The party has its largest membership in Chicago and New York. In Chicago meetings have been made extra difficult by the Illinois law which forbids renting property to an outlaw organization of this character. Property owners who become suspicious often call us to make sure on this point."

"It is my individual conviction that the United Communist Party, the old Communist Party and kindred associations of this nature are unlawful in that they advocate the overthrow of the government by force and violence."

Bolshevik Program. "The original communist party, which was organized here a year ago took a stand against participating in elections. This it held to be of no use and it urged a Bolshevik program. I have no knowledge myself of literature being recently distributed urging taking part in the presidential election, as was reported in newspaper columns from the east at the time, but if this was the case, it was in line with what the party appears to stand for."

"It will be recalled that pamphlets, literature and circular letters were sent out broadcast to members of the Communist Party and that lecturers gave instructions at their meetings that if at any time a member was interviewed or attempted to be interviewed by any person, particularly by a federal or state officer, to answer no questions and tell them nothing, and in the event of a member being arrested, to say nothing, and that as soon as possible he would be provided with a defense."

Brazilian Mayor Urges Commuters to Camp Out

BUENOS AIRES, Nov. 22.—"Camping out," North American style, in localities within commuting distance of Buenos Aires and the spending of vacations in the open air, like the "Yanquis," is being encouraged by Mayor Cantillo, of Buenos Aires.

The Mayor has acted on suggestions sent to him by the Argentine Ambassador at Washington, Tomas Lebreton, who was much impressed by the enjoyment and health obtained by the inhabitants of tent and bungalow colonies which he observed during recent travels throughout the United States, especially in California and Yellowstone Park.

The suggestions are contained in a long letter from Ambassador Lebreton, published in full by the newspapers, in which he describes the benefits of spending the summer season in the country or seaside air. He dwells at length on a bungalow colony developed outside the city of Los Angeles, which he thought could be imitated by Buenos Aires.

As a beginning, Mayor Cantillo has induced the heads of various institutions, including the "Universidad Popular," a free school for workmen, to undertake the organization of campaign colonies and the selecting of sites.

Civilian Rifle Clubs Train For Emergencies

(By Associated Press) INDIANAPOLIS, Nov. 23.—The military importance of the many rifle clubs that have been organized in Indiana cities is emphasized in a statement issued today by Adjutant General Harry B. Smith of the Indiana National Guard. Civilian training with the army rifle, the adjutant general says, give a backbone for a great emergency army.

"Without the soldier armed with a rifle and capable of using it effectively, no army can make progress," says the statement. "An army whose members can not shoot effectively is only a disciplined mob."

"The training of a man with the object of making him a marksman should commence on his home grounds and every town and city should have a range up to 500 or 600 yards so situated that there would be no handicap by reason of distance to be traversed in order to practice. All preliminary firing should be under the direction of a coach who should teach the individual how to get his sights, how to care for his rifle and how best to avoid accidental discharge of the weapon."

"These instructions are best given and observed in organizations of military character like the National Guard for the reason that the members are under control and subject to direct orders of the officers."

Western Union Files Suit To Construct Miami Cable

(By Associated Press) WASHINGTON, Nov. 23.—The Western Union Telegraph company applied to the District of Columbia supreme court Monday for an injunction to restrain Secretary of the Navy Daniels from interfering in the construction of a telegraphic cable between Miami and Miami Beach, Fla.

The Western Union company also asked the court to require the naval secretary to instruct subordinates, officials and naval officers to cease threatening to destroy the cable if laid. The company in its petition that the requested injunction would cover a different cable line than the Barbadoes cable, the laying of which was prevented several months ago by the sending of war ships to Miami.

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Whale With Hind Legs Is Puzzle to Scientists

NEW YORK, Nov. 23.—Capture off the coast of British Columbia of a remarkable humpback whale with two hind limbs became known here recently when the bones of the unique appendages arrived at the American Museum of Natural History. Scientists attached to the museum thumbed their noses on evolution, cudgled their brains and concluded the legs might have been a singular reversion to primitive type.

Back in prehistoric ages, they said, the multigreat granddads of modern whales may have strutted about on land. But, so far as they knew, no other whale with bones outside the body had ever been seen by man.

There was no earthly or watery reason for the rear legs on the whale found off the British Columbia coast. It couldn't walk on them, as they were but four feet long, while the whale weighed several tons. It couldn't use them for swimming, as they were not flappers nor were the pedal extremities webbed. They were simply excess baggage.

But now they are the subject of lectures, lantern slides and profound discussion.

Landowners in Spain Accused of Profiteering

(By Associated Press) MADRID, Nov. 22.—Alleged profiteering by landowners has aroused an agitation here for a tax on the increases in land values. A writer in the newspaper La Libertad, accuses the proprietors of rapacity in increasing the prices at which they held their farm lands and of taking advantage of the high cost of home-grown grain brought about by the advance in freight rates on the foreign product. He says they have advanced their land prices to five and six times former values without paying anything into the national treasury as a tax on this appreciation.

An instance is cited in which an owner sold one farm at nine times the price he paid for it five years ago. The newspaper writer declares that these large increases have cost the landowner practically nothing, but asserts that it is high time a law taxing the increase on land values should be established in Spain, modeled after those in Germany, Canada and Australia.

TOTTERING FOR 600 YEARS

The famous Leaning Tower of Pisa is of pure white Carrara marble in the Gothic style. CAMP FUNSTON HUMS IN CIVIL ACTIVITIES

CAMP FUNSTON, Kas., Nov. 23.—This big cantonment, where thousands of young men received their training before going to France during the World war, is today humming with a variety of activities that would make the erstwhile doughboys, artillerymen and machine gunners blink with amazement. Today Camp Funston is not only training men to be soldiers, but is also training them to be farmers, electricians, carpenters, automobile mechanics and electrical workers. There is also training for men who want to learn to operate moving pictures.

A farm where scientific farming and dairying methods are taught is part of the school work at Camp Funston this year. A large herd of dairy cattle has been bought by the military authorities. The government dairy is reported on a paying basis.

Soldiers receive military training in the morning and do school work in the afternoon. Attendance at the school is voluntary, except in the case of illiterate soldiers, who are required to attend grammar school. There is also a high school course. Those soldiers who do not choose to attend school are given military training in the afternoon.
