

## LIVING COST HITS ENGLISH BISHOPS; GIVE UP RESIDENCES

LONDON, Nov. 24.—High dignitaries of the English church are finding difficulty in making their official stipends meet the high cost of living.

Dr. Winnington Ingram, the bishop of London, has leased his town mansion in St. James square and announces that he is quite prepared to give up Fulham Palace, his magnificent official residence. The bishop's stipend is £10,000 a year. Being a man of simple habits, he does not spend \$1,000 a year on himself, yet he is often heard to say that he is "worse off now than when he was a curate."

The Archbishop of York and primate of England, Cosmo Gordon Lang, declares that it is quite impossible for him to maintain his home, Bishopthorpe Palace, and entertain his clergy adequately, on his official income of £9,000 a year, although he is a bachelor, says the Evening Standard.

The Bishop of Winchester, with £5,500 annual income, is in a similar plight. He has to maintain Farnham Castle, the largest bishop's palace in the country, with a deer park which is one of the sights of England.

The Bishop of Litchfield definitely announces that he is about to change his palace for a small house. He states that, although the yearly income of his see is £4,200, the necessary official charges leave him only £1,200 for the upkeep of the palace, which really requires £2,000 per year.

The Bishop of Worcester, who draws £3,900, is also considering the advisability of leasing his vast palace, Hartlebury Castle, to take a more modest dwelling.

Very painful injuries were sustained by Louis W. Grieswell, 520 South Ninth street, when he was struck by an automobile, on South Eighth street, between B and C streets, while riding a bicycle to work. The car was driven by John Fisher, living about three miles south of Richmond on the Straight line.

According to the story told by Mr. Grieswell, he was riding his bicycle in the gutter, and going north. Fisher, who was also going north, endeavored to avoid a street car coming south, and turned into the gutter. Fisher later told Grieswell that mist on his windshield obstructed his view.

Grieswell was pinned beneath the car and it was necessary to lift a wheel from his shoulder before he could be extricated. He suffered a deep scalp wound and severe injuries to his right shoulder.

Mr. Grieswell said he had to jump from his bicycle Tuesday night to avoid being run down by an automobile.

Nusbaum, who resigned the leadership of the city band, was unanimously elected vice president of the organization at its meeting Monday evening.

Richmond City band will be made into a concert band by Director Maddy and 30 more players will be added to its personnel. The new concert band voted to offer its services to the Chamber of Commerce for its organization meeting on Dec. 1. Later a winter concert will be put on by the band.

Prof. Maddy is attracting much attention by his work in the musical field here. He has organized an orchestra in each of the grade schools, besides the one in Garfield and the two in high school. Classes in violin and piano also have been started for grade school children under his supervision, which give the children an opportunity to study under excellent teachers at a very small cost.

At the high school, a glee club, several choruses and the high school band have been organized under his supervision. His ability as a director was revealed at the concert of the Richmond Symphony orchestra on Nov. 15.

### Acute Bread Shortage Prevails in Madrid

MADRID, Nov. 23.—This city and its immediate neighborhood is again in the grasp of an acute bread shortage. In the poor districts bread lines half a mile long form in the early hours this morning and the people remained for hours outside the bakers despite the sharpness of the weather.

Efforts are being made by the government to improve the situation by issuing bread from military bakeries, but matters have been rendered difficult by master bakers who refused to grant wage increases demanded by the men. Bakery employees, as a result threaten a general strike. In the meantime ordinary loaves of bread are virtually unobtainable.

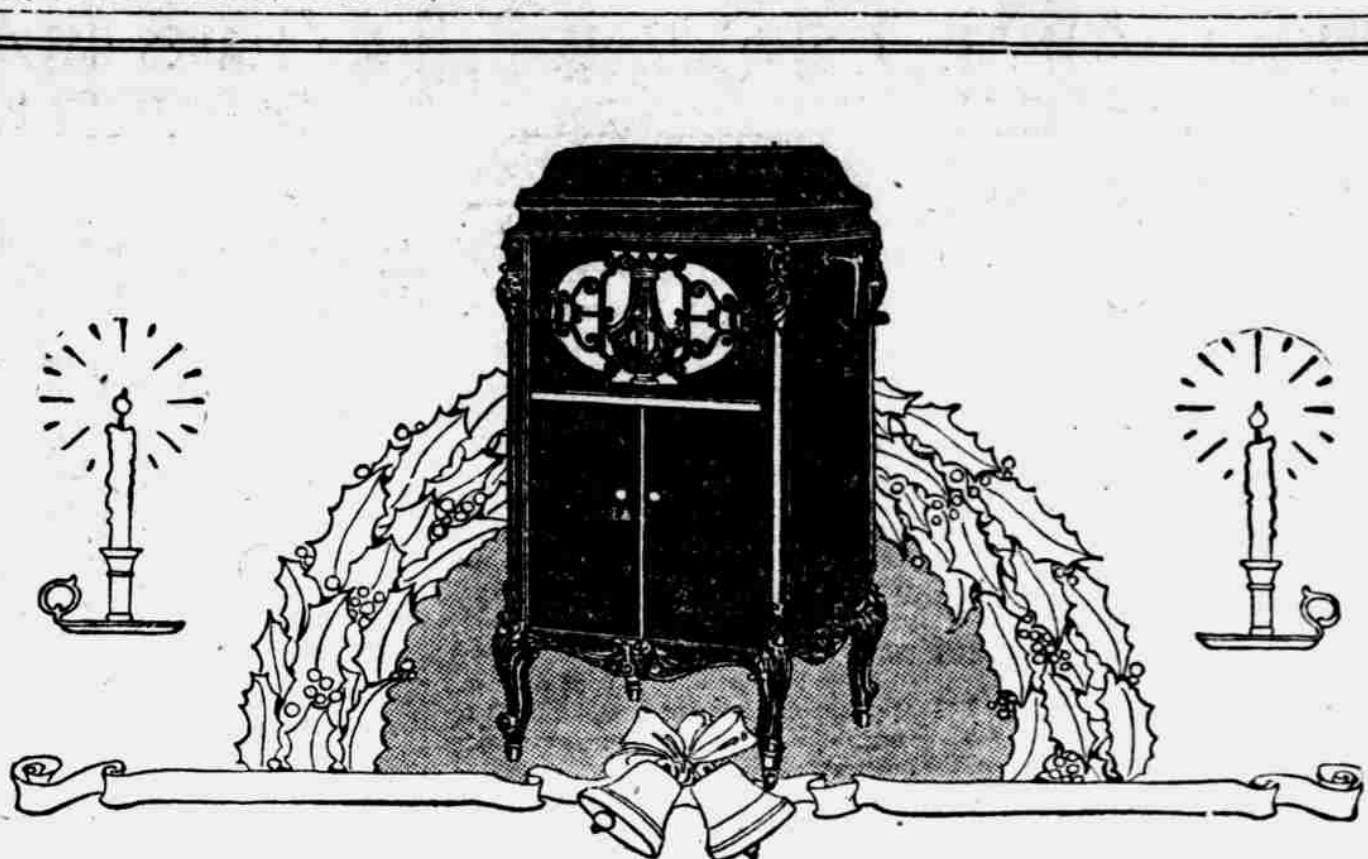
