

CHICKEN BREEDERS OPEN THIRD SHOW AT EATON TUESDAY

EATON, O., Dec. 7.—Third annual show of the Western Ohio Poultry Fanciers' club, made up largely of chicken breeders of Eaton and one or two from other parts of the country, opened here today in the state armory, East Main street, and will continue until Tuesday of next week. The show will be open next Sunday, it is announced.

Officials and managers of the show state that a heavy list of entries have been received and filed. Some of the entries from a distance were received today. It is expected upward of one thousand birds will be exhibited. The show carries an attractive prize list.

Len Rawnsley, of St. Matthews, Ky., a judge of national and international prominence, will judge the entries and make the awards, which will be made under the comparison system. The local organization is a member of the national poultry breeders' association.

Charles Rule, of Eaton, is president of the club, and Harry W. Deem is secretary. H. C. Duvall of Eaton, is superintendent of the show.

Bread prices in Eaton show a decline. Product of a Cincinnati baking concern has been reduced 2 and 3 cents, retail, in the local market. A loaf weighing one pound and eight ounces that retailed at 18 cents has been reduced to 15 cents, the old price, while a one-pound loaf that retailed at 12 cents has been reduced to 10 cents, the old price.

Two local bakeries have been offering a "Saturday special" of three regular 10-cent loaves for 25 cents. Cakes, cookies and the like in local bakeries have declined little if any in price.

Despite the fact that Eaton has three bakeries, much shipped-in bread is brought here daily from Dayton, Cincinnati, Hamilton and Richmond, Ind., and some from West Alexandria.

Officials of seven county offices

have been allowed by the county commissioners an aggregate of \$12,592.53 with which to pay salaries of deputies clerks and assistants for the year 1921.

Incoming Probate Judge Byron Landis was allowed the sum of \$1,075, while A. D. Davis, present judge, was allowed the sum of \$187.50 for the remainder of his term, after January 1.

The other allowances are: Auditor, S. C. Hunt, \$3,311.55; treasurer, C. E. Samuels, \$2,768.47; clerk, V. O. Rookstool, \$1,200; recorder, T. F. Ogden, \$1,150.01; Sheriff, George Jones, \$1,300, of which \$100 is for extra deputy hire; surveyor, C. A. Burns, \$1,600.

The amounts granted by the commissioners were based upon a certain per cent of the yearly fees of each office, which is fixed by law. In each instance the allowance represents the amount asked for by each official, it is said. The allowances had been under consideration of the commissioners for some time.

Under a new law it is possible for an official to appeal from the commissioners' action to common pleas court.

Try Lyons Case.
Presentation of evidence and testimony in trial of an assault and battery case against Le Roy Lyons was completed at the close of common pleas court Monday evening, after occupying the court all day. Arguments of the state and defense counsel were to be presented this forenoon, after which the case was to go to the jury.

Refusal of the Saxon football team of Dayton, to play after appearing upon the field resulted in its forfeiture of a game Sunday, at West Alexandria, to the Eaton juniors, an independent team made up largely of students of the Eaton high school. The preceding Sunday the Saxons defeated the Eaton juniors at West Alexandria by a score of 44 to 0.

Trust Company Resources Show Large Increase

Indiana trust company resources at the close of business June 30, were for the first time in excess of \$200,000,000, according to "Trust Companies of the United States." The total figures for the state are \$206,692,628, a gain of \$29,391,412, or about 10 per cent over last year.

The trust company resources of the United States increased nearly 12 per cent and aggregate \$12,451,877,583, which is considerably in excess of the total banking strength of the country in 1901.

The total resources of the 2,241 trust companies reach the total of \$12,451,877,583.58, an increase of \$1,301,431,496.05 over the figures of last year, and \$6,123,423,555 greater than those of five years ago.
