

CITIZENS CONSIDER RELIEF OF CHILDREN STARVING IN EUROPE

A number of Richmond business men representing various local organizations, and Mrs. Paul Comstock, representing the Woman's club, met in the Chamber of Commerce rooms at 4 p. m., Monday, to consider raising money for relief of suffering children of Europe. The meeting was called by S. E. Nicholson, of this city, who is interested in the work of the European Relief Council, which is endeavoring to provide for starving people in the war ravaged countries. Herbert Hoover is chairman of the organization.

It is the plan of this body to raise \$33,000,000 in the United States, with which to carry on the enterprise. To do this it is evident that every county and state in the union must be fully prepared to make an effort in the work. Of this \$33,000,000, 25 per cent is to go to the Red Cross, five per cent to general relief work, and the remaining 70 per cent toward the feeding of the three and a half million starving people in Poland, Austria, Hungary, Germany, Czechoslovakia, and the Baltic provinces, according to Mr. Nicholson.

Banded together in the European Relief Council are the following: American Friends Service committee, American Red Cross, American Relief administration, Federal Council of the Churches of Christian America, Jewish Joint Distribution committee, Knights of Columbus, Young Men's Christian association, and the Young Women's Christian association.

It was decided by those attending the meeting Monday that the work in this community in the interest of relief, should be carried on under the direction of the heads of the old Wayne County War Work council.
