

PROGRESS IN HOUSE ORGANIZATION URGED BY WAYNE CO. MAN

In order to avoid delay in handling problems that will come up in the next session of the state legislature, through the fight for the speakership, now impending, James M. Knapp, representative from Wayne County, has proposed a plan of organization whereby the matter may be settled at once without consuming valuable time.

His proposal is embodied in a letter to E. M. Wasmuth, a copy of which follows:

Dear Sir:

I have been giving the question of the selection of a Speaker for the House of Representatives considerable thought. I have been hoping all along that conditions would be such that would enable the House to enter into what promises to be, one of the most important sessions of the General Assembly, without first having had to go through a long drawn out contest for the speakership. It is now about five weeks until the time of the usual pre-legislative session caucus, but I believe, that for the best interests of the people of the State, and to make sure of a more harmonious working body, that this precedent be not followed, but that the Republican House members should assemble without delay and decide now who they wished to be speaker. I would suggest however, that consent of all speakership candidates be secured, before such a call is made. Such a plan as this would give the "Speaker To Be" ample time to carefully work out his committee assignments so that he would be ready to announce them on the opening day of the session, and get down to business without the delay that has attended sessions in the past. The people of the State have a right to expect that the prospects for a real constructive legislative session shall not be injured in the outset by petty jealousies and feuds that often result from such contests as these. Therefore I am for getting this matter settled at an early date, and then every fellow lend a hand toward giving the State a real constructive legislative programme.

DEFINITE APPROVAL OF NATIONAL PARK SYSTEM IS SOUGHT

(By Associated Press)
WASHINGTON, Dec. 7.—Definite approval by Congress of a comprehensive plan for development of the national park system will be sought by the National Park Service of the Department of Interior in submitting its 1922 appropriation estimates.

The estimates, which were outlined in a statement today by the Park Service, total \$2,473,594, and provide for construction of roads, sanitary systems, camping grounds and electric lighting plants for the public camps and hotels in addition to the regular expenses of maintenance and administration. The estimates exceed the appropriation for the current year by approximately \$1,500,000—all of which the service plans to use in inaugurating its development program.

"The increase asked for," the statement issued by the park service said, "is admittedly large, but it should be remembered that these pleasureing

The service said it would submit with its estimates figures showing that each year the national parks return to the federal treasury in the form of revenues a large dividend on the investment. These revenues in the 1920 fiscal year were said to have amounted to approximately 35 percent of the cost of maintaining the parks that year while the revenues this year are expected to amount to 40 percent of the year's cost. The suggestion is added that should the development program be approved it is expected that the revenues within a few years will be brought to a figure approximating the cost of administration, maintenance and protection.

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Far Sighted Policy is Needed in Internal Affairs, is Report

WASHINGTON, Dec. 7.—Need of a far-sighted government policy with respect to many of the country's internal affairs is emphasized in the annual report of Secretary Payne, made public today at the Interior Department. Lack of a definite aim was said to affect particularly the administration of activities in Alaska, in dealing with the Indian tribes, in preservation of the national parks and forests and again in handling the greater reconstruction problem of maintaining a high agricultural production.

While Mr. Payne criticized the uncertainty which he said surrounded many activities, he commended as a strong constructive step the action of congress in making possible the "super-power survey" of the region between Boston and Washington with a view to the development of a unified system of power generation and distribution. This investigation, made under the direction of the Interior Department, will be completed and the committee's report given to the public about next June, the secretary said, adding that he believed it would deserve public confidence.

Transportation Problem.

On the subject of Alaska, the secretary said the primal problem was transportation and advocated the development of a government owned steamship line in order to insure development of the territory's resources. Two lines now serve the region, but Mr. Payne indicated their service was not satisfactory. He suggested their consolidation as a means of improving the service but this apparently was impossible.

The government railroad in Alaska to be a total of 640 miles in length will be completed and in operation in 1922. Mr. Payne reported. He added that it tapped fields of untold mineral wealth and praised the work of the engineers in the progress made.

In connection with Secretary Payne's discussion of Alaskan transportation, Governor Riggs, the territorial executive, urged the establishment of a tonnage tax on all shipping to and in the territory and the building up with the fund thus raised of "regular and reasonable service upon equitable rates and schedules." He advocated a

government appropriations for the construction of a scheme of highways to serve as feeder wagon roads to the government own rail lines.

WASHINGTON, Dec. 7.—The United States should not be subject to the danger of having to rely on foreign countries for charts for American vessels, Rear Admiral Edward Simpson,

Hydrographer, says in his annual report today to Secretary Daniels. He recommends legislation to augment the staff in the hydrographer's office to remedy the present situation.

"With the present force this dangerous dependence on foreign charts in certain localities, notably Europe, Australia and the East Indies, will con-

tinue for forty years or more," the report asserts.

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
