

## LITIGATION IN EATON ENDS IN COMPROMISE AS JURY TAKES CASE

EATON, O., Dec. 15.—Trial of a suit for cancellation of a lease and for damages ended Tuesday afternoon in common pleas court when a compromise was effected by counsel for the litigants. A jury had taken places in the jury-box and the first witness had been called when the court was advised that overtures had been made for a compromise of the case.

Frank M. and Gertrude Wood had brought the suit against Jim Bowman, who holds a lease on their farm in Somers township, near Camden. They sought \$1,342 damages in addition to cancellation of the lease, which remained effective for a year after March 1, next.

By terms of the compromise Bowman will surrender his lease on or before March 1, next; surrenders all interest in growing crops and releases Wood and his wife from all claims for any damages. Wood and his wife pay Bowman \$100 and release him from all claims for any damages. The litigants are not to annoy or harass one another, and Bowman is to surrender the farm in good condition. Wood and his wife pay the costs of the suit, \$132.57. The court issued an order restraining the litigants from molesting or interfering with one another.

Upward of fifty witnesses were on hand for the trial, as also were a goodly number of residents of Somers township.
