

"CHECK IMMIGRATION" SAYS OFFICIAL NOW LOCATED IN EUROPE

BERLIN, Dec. 15.—Emigration to the United States from central Europe has reached a stage where it threatens to dump into America nearly 1,000,000 of the "most undesirable peoples of Europe," says an official of the American state department, who has been watching the recent exodus with much concern.

The emigrants are mostly from Russia and Poland, and large numbers of them, who are very poor, have been directly assisted with money and advice from America, the correspondent was told. Consular offices are swamped with their applications for passports, steamship accommodations are inadequate to carry all who have permits to sail.

Is Serious Question.
"There is virtually no check on this movement, which beyond any question must soon be a most serious problem in America," the correspondent was informed. "An effort has been made to keep out the so-called 'Reds', but that, too, is futile, for it is impossible to investigate the applicants carefully enough to exclude undesirables."

"The only thing that can be done, it seems to me, is a new immigration law sharply curtailing this business of dumping the down-and-outs of Europe upon our shores. And that, too, is going to be a difficult thing, for there will always be the possibility of discrimination against classes that would make valuable citizens. If immigration should be stopped for a few years, say five, we might wake up to the situation in America, and seek a way out of the trouble."

Law is Inadequate.
"The government's agents have been doing their best to meet the emergency with the machinery of the law, but that is pitifully inadequate. About all that can be done is to send department of justice agents to New York and 'warn' the grafters and the more radical promoters of this immigration that they must not resort to illegal means. Some of them who were reaping rich rewards out of the passport business—pretending to secure proper papers for sums paid in hand—have been frightened off, but there are others still at work."

"One of these grafters has moved to Berlin and probably is doing a thriving business. Nothing can be done about it. He is within the law, as far as we are concerned. He may go out and collect any amount of fees for 'assisting' immigrants to secure passports—and whether he succeeds in getting the papers, which can not be held up if the applicant meets the requirements, or not, he can keep the money. The applicant won't 'sneal'."

"However, such men are only a part of the scheme to shift the immigrants into America."

UNION CITY PARENTS PLACED UNDER ARREST

UNION CITY, Ind., Dec. 15.—Several parents and guardians of school children in Union City, who have not been vaccinated for smallpox, were arrested today by Ulysses Davison, of Winchester, sheriff of Randolph county. The sheriff announced that his list of persons to be taken in charge included approximately 45.

The arrests are the result of conflict between the board of health here and the school board. Dr. Frank Rubey, secretary of the board of health, backed by the other members, recently issued an order directing that all the pupils be vaccinated. The school board, including C. A. Chattin, C. L.

Northlake and Roll Hill, refused to recognize the instruction as binding. An examination of the 552 pupils was made yesterday by members of the board of health, and forty-two of the children, it was found, had not been vaccinated. They were ordered home and told, it is said, to remain there until the vaccination order had been complied with. Today, however, several of the children returned to their classes without having complied with the vaccination order. The arrests followed.

Members of the school board contend that there are no cases of smallpox in Union City, although some surrounding places have reported the disease, and that the order of the board of health is not necessary. The city board of health, it is understood, has

taken all its steps after consultation with Dr. J. N. Hurty, of Indianapolis, secretary of the state board of health.

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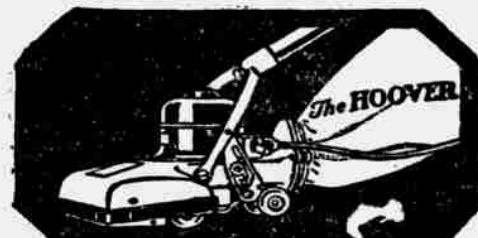
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
