

LOW PRICES RESULT IN PEACEFUL LIFE FOR OHIO MUSKRATS

PORT CLINTON, O., Dec. 15.—The opening of the muskrat season last week failed to witness a frenzied rush of pelt hunters as for the last few seasons. The useful muskrat skin, from which many of mid-lady's fur garments are made, and which when plucked and dyed, becomes the popular Hudson Seal, has skidded downward greatly in price this year, according to early reports from the fur-trapping sections of the state, and trappers are showing apathy in going after the rat pelts.

First quotations from the fur dealers give 25 and 25 cents as the price for early muskrat pelts, the lowest price in years it is said.

For a great many years, the average per pelt was around \$1.25, and last year as high as \$4.60 a pelt was given by fur buyers.

Expect Fur Shortage

The prices of other furs are accordingly low, and veteran trappers are predicting a fur shortage next winter as the result. Some of the early quotations in this district give skunk a pelt price of \$1.50, while \$6 was a common price last year.

Coyote pelts, it is said, will bring around \$2 this year. Last year, \$8 and \$10 were looked for at least. One of the farmers of this section was fortunate enough to receive \$18.75 for a black mink pelt last season, and the price for the ordinary mink as quoted so far, is from \$1.25 to \$3.50.

However, with the advance of winter, prices are expected to react to somewhat higher levels, but the high prices of last year are gone for a long time and perhaps for ever, it is felt.

The muskrat in this section has become one of the most sought after fur bearing animals. Owners of many tracts of marshlands around here do not allow hunting or trapping on their land, unless for the purpose of rounding up the little rats in numbers for the market.

Muskrat a Delicacy

In some localities, the muskrat was so plentiful last year that even business men in the towns would close shop and spend a few days making some of the easy money for the high-priced pelts. The carcasses of the rats are sold in numbers to clubs and lunch stands and bring from 15 to 25 cents each. When properly prepared, the muskrat is looked upon as a most desirable delicacy.

The volume of business made annually by muskrat trappers is surprising in northwestern Ohio, along the shores of Lake Erie, and Sandusky Bay and the rivers. It has been estimated that Ottawa county alone last year gave up more than \$750,000 of the pelts for the markets.

The low prices, which are expected to discourage hunters going in great numbers as for the last few years, is looked upon favorably by many, who figure that trapping next year will be just that much better."

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

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
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
