

ANTI-SALOON LEAGUE SPEAKERS WILL FILL RICHMOND PULPITS

Eight representatives of the Indiana Anti-Saloon league are to occupy pulpits in Richmond and Wayne county this coming Sunday in the interests of the anti-saloon cause.

In addition to the filling of pulpits in city and county at the morning and evening services, a meeting in the interest of law enforcement will be held at the Grace Methodist church at 2:30 o'clock in the afternoon. This meeting is to be attended by ministers and the laity from the different churches of the city, and others interested in the enforcement of the law. It is believed that at this meeting some special attention will be given to the lawless conditions that have obtained in Richmond for some time past.

Shumaker Speaks Twice. E. S. Shumaker, superintendent of the Indiana Anti-Saloon league, will speak at the St. Paul Lutheran church in the morning and at a union meeting in the Methodist church in Dublin in the evening.

R. C. Minton, attorney of the Anti-Saloon league, speaks at the West Richmond Friends church in the morning and in the Cambridge City Methodist church in the evening.

C. J. Everson, field secretary, speaks at the Third Methodist church in the morning, and in the first Christian church in the evening. E. A. Miles, field secretary, speaks in the Reid Memorial church in the morning and at the Methodist church at Economy in the evening.

J. E. Martin, of Indianapolis, speaks at the Second English Lutheran church in the morning, and at Greensfork M. E. church in the evening.

E. M. Barney, of Indianapolis, speaks at the East Main street Friends church in the morning and at the Pershing Evangelical church in the evening.

D. Robinson, field secretary, speaks in the First Methodist church in the morning; and at the Chester M. E. church in the evening. S. P. McNaught, attorney of the Anti-Saloon league, speaks at the First Presbyterian church in the morning and at the First Baptist church at the evening service.

Law Enforcement Service. At the afternoon law enforcement service the speakers will be S. P. McNaught, R. C. Minton and E. S. Shumaker. The meeting will last for one hour only.

Richmond is the home of Timothy Nicholson, the honored president of the Indiana Anti-Saloon league, and also the home of S. E. Nicholson, author of the Indiana Nicholson law, and organizer of the Anti-Saloon League of America. It is believed that the messages of the representatives of the league, in view of the fact that both state and nation are now dry, and in further view of the necessity for a tightening up of the machinery of the law generally for law enforcement, will be heard with unusual interest this year.

SEAL SALE OF 1920 PROMISES SUCCESS

INDIANAPOLIS, Ind., Dec. 18.—For the first time in the history of anti-tuberculosis work in Indiana, serious shortage of Christmas seals occurred last week, the heavy demand for the little holiday stickers from the 32 county organizations using up 25,000,000 seals early in the 1920 sale and many millions since.

By dint of strenuous work Murray A. Auerbach, executive secretary of the Indiana Tuberculosis association, obtained counties and shipment of these additional seals now have been distributed to the county organizations everywhere in Indiana. A total of more than thirty-five million seals eventually was distributed.

The 1920 Seal Sale in Indiana apparently is to be more successful than any previous sale. Cooperation of the individuals and the organizational life everywhere in Indiana has made possible a remarkable seal sale, and the 1921 anti-tuberculosis program, made possible because of the unusually heavy seal sale now in prospect, already has been mapped on a scale that should be reflected immediately in decreasing death rates throughout Indiana.

Savings Fund President Indicted for Embezzling

WILMINGTON, Del., Dec. 17.—William Bush, secretary and treasurer of the Wilmington Savings Fund society, was arrested Friday on a warrant charging him with embezzlement of securities owned by the society valued at \$200,000. At a hearing before a magistrate he was held on \$100,000 bail for general sessions court.

COWS PRODUCE WEALTH.

URBANA, Ill., Dec. 18.—A quarter million dollars has been added to the wealth of 500 dairymen in Illinois, who have been members of cow testing associations during the past three years, according to the members of the Dairy Department at the University of Illinois.

Each of 36 associations is composed of approximately 26 dairy farmers who own in the neighborhood of 300 to 500 cows. The dairymen join these cooperative associations in order to have feed records and milk records kept on each of their cows.

HEAVY ARGENTINA CROP

(By Associated Press.)
BUENOS AIRES, Dec. 18.—Argentina's wheat crop for 1920, now ready for the harvest, gives prospects of a heavy and profitable yield. Official figures place the area seeded this year at 6,073,100 hectares (of 2½ acres) or about 23,000 hectares more than in the previous year. La Razon estimates that the crop for 1920-21 will reach 5,500,000 tons and La Epoca figures 5,000,000. The oats and linseed crops share the good prospects of the wheat.

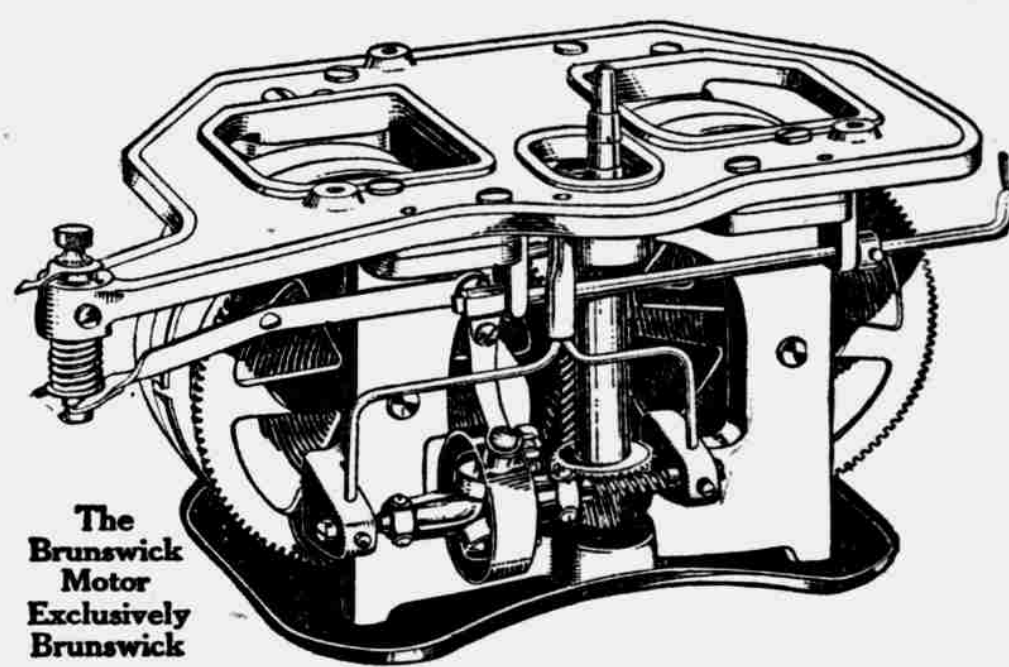
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
