Williamsburg Pike Route May Be Straightened Soon

Measures to straighten the way from the north end of Sheridan street to the Williamsburg pike are being agitated among citizens of Richmond and vicinity. A petition asking the county council to take up the matter, will be circulated shortly. It is said, "As the road is laid out at present, the Williamsburg pike runs into Sheridan street at an angle, and it is necessary for vehicles to go a considerable distance out of the way, in following the route. The new way proposed will eliminate two dangerous turns and substitute a straight stretch of road about 25 rods in length in place of the old route. It will enable Sheridan street to run directly into the pike without corners of any kind."

CHRISTMAS DINNER CHEAPER
SAN FRANCISCO, Dec. 24.—Christmas shoppers of San Francisco today found practically all components of the Christmas dinner lower in price than last year, according to announcement by grocers.
