Ohio Reader—Are there many vacant farm houses in Ohio, and how many persons work on farms?—A farm survey of Ohio for the year ending last June was made by W. F. Callender, agricultural statistician for the United States Bureau of Crop Estimates, shows that there are now 410,000 men and boys working on Ohio farms compared to 470,000 a year ago, and one-half million three years ago. The survey shows twenty-nine thousand vacant inhabitable houses on farms this year, compared to eighteen thousand a year previous.

Most of our mistakes are made in ignorance. We do not understand. If we only knew more!

Knowledge has at least two very important sources. There is knowledge which comes through accurate seeing and that which results from understanding.

I passed by a noted place the other day. I had seen it many times before. I had thought, "But as I approached it this latest time, I made up my mind that I would try to understand it better in all that it meant to me. And ever since that time I have been recalling things that I had never seen before about the place."

Today I talked with a man who could see none of the wonderful virtues that I attributed to one of my finest friends. I could not understand it, for the companionship of this friend of mine had proved so rich and true. So I just said: "If you only knew him better—as he really is—you would think as I do about him."

If we only knew more about the ones we already love and admire. Every time I look into the face of a flower, or eat a meal, or take a car ride, or read a newspaper or book, I feel such an inadequacy of real knowledge. I feel helpless in the arms of mystery and wonder. For the more you think about the commonest gifts of nature and the way men have taken

advantage of its wealth, the more knowledge you come to want. If we only knew more, how many new worlds we would be able to enter!

Let us try to learn more—to be self-appointed discoverers and explorers—always bringing back knowledge to our own limited brain worlds, but at the same time planting our overflow of ideas and good services as we go.

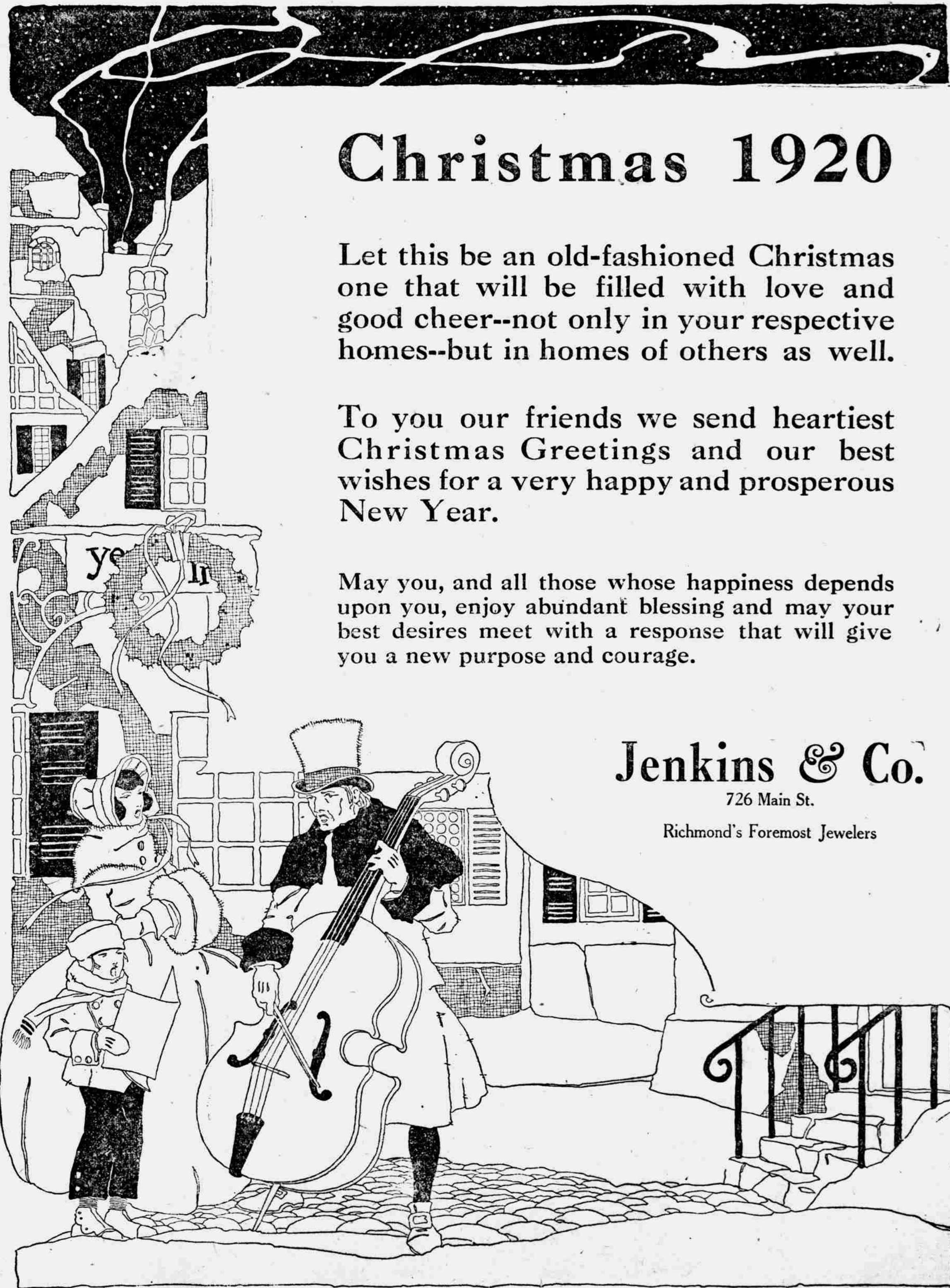
