

# TAX COMMISSIONERS CITE WAYNE LEVIES IN COMING REPORTS

(By Associated Press)  
INDIANAPOLIS, Dec. 27.—Many Indiana counties will pay more taxes next year than is warranted by economically administered government, declares the State Board of Tax Commissioners in a report that will be placed before the legislature next month.

In this connection the board says the "home rule" bill, passed six months ago, apparently has been misunderstood because in only two counties did taxpayers formally attack the levies fixed by local authorities. This presents a problem for the legislature, says the board, suggesting that some check be placed on local taxing authorities in fixing tax levies and issuing bonds.

For the whole state, the board says, the average of 1914 rates is \$1.50, an increase from \$1.34 for 1913. In the first year of the application of the new state tax law. Under the old law the average for 1918 was \$3.01, says the board, which further asserts that the \$1.80 rate is equivalent to \$4.60 under the old law.

Not Understood  
"The Johnson home rule bill passed by the special session of the legislature," says the board, "took away the power of the state board over tax levies effective immediately and over bonds issued after Jan. 1, 1921. This law seems not to have been understood by the taxpayers, as only in two counties were petitions filed by taxpayers protesting against the tax levies fixed by the local authorities. This board is fully convinced that the taxpayers are entitled to some consideration on the question of tax levies. A careful investigation will show that in many counties the state more taxes are collected during the year 1921 than government economically administered will warrant.

Assign Failure  
"Failure on the part of the taxpayers to invoke the remedy provided by the Johnson home rule bill, or the inefficiency of the remedy therein provided, may be the reason why proper relief was not granted."

Tax levies fixed for 1920 by the local authorities were cited by the board. Along with these were given the rates necessary on the old valuation to raise the same revenue as also the rates finally approved by the state board for 1919. Levies for Wayne county follow:
