

**COURT OF APPEALS  
CONFIRMS DECISION  
IN CASE AT EATON**

EATON, O., Dec. 30.—Finding of the lower court in the A. L. Heckman and D. W. Shirley suits has been affirmed by the court of appeals, decision of the higher court being received here by Clerk of Courts V. O. Rockstool. Heckman is victor in the two cases.

A. L. and Laura Heckman sued D. W. Shirley in common pleas court for re-establishment of a farm line fence, and the Heckmans won the decision, after which the Shirlleys took appeal to the court of appeals.

D. W. and Rosa Shirley sued A. L. and Laura Heckman for damages, alleging Heckman's turkeys had damaged their farm crops. The suit having first been brought in a justice's court, where the Shirlleys obtained a judgment, Heckman appealed to common pleas' court, claiming that because of the amount of damages sued for the justice's court was without jurisdiction, which resulted in reversal of the justice's judgment. Shirlleys took appeal to the higher court.

Both cases were heard before Judge Walter Jones, of Troy.

**Soldier's Body Shipped.**

Remains of Donald R. Cohee, 18, are enroute to the United States from San Domingo, where young Cohee died December 21, while in the marine service, according to advice received by his parents Mr. and Mrs. James Cohee, residing near Eaton. Word of their son's death was received by Mr. and Mrs. Cohee from the navy department at Washington, D. C., but details were not given. They will be notified by the department when the body reaches a port in this country. The remains will be brought to the parents' home for funeral and burial.

Cohee had been stationed at San Domingo the last 15 months. He enlisted in the marine service in April, 1919, being assigned to the U. S. S. Kettner. He was attached as trumpeter to the 782nd company, 15th regiment, marine corps.

**Resigns as Carrier.**

After almost 15 years service, A. C. Fudge has resigned as carrier on R. F. D. No. 1, out of the Eaton post-office, the resignation to become effective next Saturday. Roy Schlotterbeck, R. F. D. No. 9, will be transferred to the route made vacant by Fudge's resignation. Schlotterbeck's successor on the route he leaves has not been announced.

Fudge has also surrendered his commission as a member of the civil service examining board of Preble county, which he had held for several years.

**Sabotage Latest Weapon  
Used by Indian Labor**

CALCUTTA, Dec. 30.—(India Information Bureau)—Indian labor for the last two months has been adopting sabotage tactics to gain its ends in various parts of the country. A notable example is one in Madras, where the provincial government has just issued a communiqué in reference to the railway disaster last month, where 14 people were killed and 21 injured. The disaster, in the opinion of the government, is the seventh out of eight cases of sabotage committed between August 14 and October 21.

The strike of stevedores in this city has held up in port 111 ocean-going steamers, instead of the normal 60 usually here. The accumulation of cargoes amounts to thousands of tons, and the glut is accentuated by the importers' financial difficulties, due to fall in the exchange.

**American Legion**

NEW YORK, Dec. 30.—Closely relations between the American Legion and Organized Labor are promised as a result of letters exchanged between F. W. Galbraith, Jr., National Commander of the Legion, and Samuel Gompers, president of the American Federation of Labor.

Mr. Galbraith's letter defined the purposes of the Legion and emphasized its neutrality in politics as a body while in no way infringing on the personal freedom of its members.

In reply, Mr. Gompers explained the effort of the A. F. of L. to make life brighter for its members and to encourage them to "perform the obligations they owe to our country and fellowmen."

Mr. Gompers said that he had aided members of trade unions to understand the Legion's purposes and that, on several occasions, resolutions pre-

sented in labor meetings had been tabled or defeated because of information he had provided in relation to the work of the Legion. The National Commander replied to this letter by saying that there was nothing in the declaration of the A. F. L. to which the Legion could object and that the Legion subscribes to every word of its sentiment.


