

UNION COUNTY BOASTS CHAMPION OF JERSEYS; GIVE OUT CORN YIELDS

LIBERTY, Ind., Dec. 31.—Earl Crawford, vice-president of the Sixth Federated district and member of the legislative committee, will address the Farmers' associations of Liberty and Harmony townships at the Dunlapville church, Friday, Jan. 7, at 7:30 p. m. A good meeting is expected.

Union County Has Champion Jersey.
The American Jersey Cattle club sends word that the new champion senior four-year-old Jersey in production lives in Union county. This cow, Jolly Letty, produced 12,499.6 pounds of milk and 837.91 pounds fat. She is owned by J. A. Driscoll, of Beuna Vacca farm. He also owns the cow which was formerly champion producer of her class in Indiana, Greeba, whose record was 537.17 pounds fat.

Yields in Five-Acre Contest.
The Indiana Corn Growers' association reports to County Agent Campbell the yields of the men finishing the five-acre corn contest this season, giving the highest 10 yields as follows:

George M. Quick, 117.1; A. D. Johnson, 96.7; Morton P. Jones, 95.17; Paul McCray, 94.8; Harlan brothers, 92.0; Jacob Whiteman, 92.5; Albert R. Dunlap, 88.8; F. W. Boyle, 85.8; Spencer L. Stevens, 83.4; Roy Carson, 80.0; Frank Winters, 80.0.

The cost records on these yields can not be published until after the short course at Purdue, since the figures will not be available until that time. Last year 15 men finished the work in Union county and 13 of them received state medals.

Argentine Provinces Would Combine Against Capital

(By Associated Press)
BUENOS AIRES, Dec. 31.—The Argentine provinces are trying to form a combination against Buenos Aires, the capital city. Overtures are being conducted between political leaders of some of the provinces for the formation of a "League of Governors" for the purpose of uniting the northern agricultural districts of the country against Buenos Aires and other coastal districts. Some political observers see in this movement an attempt to return to the former division of the country politically into opposing sections while others maintain that it merely is an economic measure having as its purpose the protection of the productive areas.

To Argentina, the city of Buenos Aires has the relation of the spout to the tea-kettle and practically all of the wealth of the country pours through it. It is at once the financial, distributing and political capital of the country. It is claimed by the leaders of the league idea, the city has disproportionate power and the northern states need union to offset this.
