

EATON JUDGE RULES MILLER MUST SPECIFY ALIENATION CHARGES

EATON, O., Feb. 1.—Charles G. Miller, farmer, will have to specify times and places his former wife, Ona Miller, was met by Enoch Buchanan for alleged immoral purposes, in a \$10,000 alienation suit filed some time ago by Miller against Buchanan. Judge A. C. Risinger, in common pleas court, sustained a motion by Buchanan to compel Miller to make his charges more specific.

Another request by Buchanan to compel Miller to state what means defendant used in allegedly meeting Mrs. Miller was overruled. Miller obtained a divorce some time ago from his wife. He named Buchanan in his complaint.

Attorney Makes Error.

Error on the part of a local lawyer in preparing two divorce petitions was responsible for dismissal of both suits from common pleas court. New petitions have been filed and both cases re-entered in the docket.

The case of Martin E. Fowler against Ada Fowler was one of the cases dismissed a few days ago in open court by Judge Risinger, upon contention of defense counsel that the petition was faulty.

The other case was that of Denver Cross against Iva Catherine Cross, which was pending trial. Cross's attorney withdrew the petition, had the case dismissed and then filed another suit. Cross alleges gross neglect.

Local Couple Wed.

Charles Mann, carpenter, and Miss Cordie Lee Green, daughter of John Green, were married Monday by the Rev. A. J. Bussard of the Methodist church.

Retired Farmer Dies.

Charles Miller, 85, native of Germany, retired farmer, and resident of Preble county for upward of 70 years, died early Monday afternoon in the home of his son, John E. Miller, a mile southwest of Richmond, Ind. Death was due to paralysis, after an illness of two years or longer. Mr. Miller came to this country and to Preble county when a boy. He leaves a comfortable estate. He was a member of the Odd Fellow fraternity. Surviving him are three sons, at whose home he died; Frank, of Campbellstown; William of Kansas City, Mo.; three daughters, Mrs. Clarence McWhinney, of West Florence; Mrs. Joseph Stover, south of Eaton; a daughter in Walla Walla, Wash.; three brothers and one sister. One brother, Fred Miller, lives in Dayton, and another brother, Gus, lives in Buffalo, N. Y. Arrangements for the funeral have not been announced, but the services will be held here in the Christian church, probably Thursday afternoon. Burial will be in Mount Hill cemetery.

Fouts Funeral Wednesday.

Serifly caused the death of Jacob Fouts, 87, Monday morning at 10 o'clock in his home a mile east of West Alexandria. He was a native of Montgomery county. Surviving him are his wife and three sons, Elwood Fouts, residing south of West Alexandria; Joseph Fouts, of Kitchell, Ind., and John Fouts of Hamilton. Funeral services will be conducted Wednesday afternoon at 1:30 o'clock in the Sugar Hill Dunkard church, east of West Alexandria, followed by burial in the cemetery at New Lexington, north of West Alexandria.

Mrs. Early Dies.

Mrs. Nellie Earley, 33, wife of Carl Earley, died Monday morning at 10:30 o'clock in the family home at Semetown, eight miles northeast of here. Pneumonia was the cause of death. Surviving are the husband, two sons and two daughters and the mother, Mrs. McBee of Fremont. Funeral services will be conducted Thursday morning at 10 o'clock at the home. Burial will be a New Lexington, Preble county.

Old Suits Dismissed.

Twenty-four cases were called for dismissal Monday by Judge A. C. Risinger in common pleas court, but only two of them were cast into the discard, as counsel in the other cases assured the court there would be hasty action in settlement or bringing the cases to trial. The suits dismissed were: Ed Moots vs. Emma Snyder and Harry Flory vs. trustees of Harrison township.

The list of cases called was prepared by Judge Risinger, under the head of "sick cases," and they were to be thrown out of court for want of prosecution. A number of the cases are rather aged.

ATTEMPT TO CAPTURE BERGDOLL CAUSE OF APOLOGY TO GERMANS

BERLIN, Feb. 1.—Brig. Gen. Henry T. Allen, commander of the American Army of Occupation on the Rhine, has made a formal apology to both the Berlin government and the government of Baden for the recent attempt by men connected with the American forces to take into custody Grover Bergdoll, American draft evader, and his chauffeur, Isaac Steuer, says an official statement issued by the government here.

The statement says that Col. Stone, acting on orders from Gen. Allen, called on the imperial commission for the occupied Rhine area and declared Gen. Allen desired to make a formal apology to the imperial German and Baden governments for the attempt to arrest Bergdoll on Baden territory. Through his official representative, the communication states, Gen. Allen declared he had given no orders for the attempt against Bergdoll, which he greatly deplored.

The order for Bergdoll's arrest, Gen. Allen stated, was issued by the provost marshal in Coblenz, who only recently arrived in Germany, and who was under the impression that Bergdoll was sojourning in the French zone of the occupied area.

WASHINGTON, Feb. 1.—Secretary Baker announced that he had received a telegram today from Maj. Gen. H. T. Allen, commanding the American forces on the Rhine, saying he had ordered investigation of the circumstances surrounding the attempt to abduct Bergdoll at Eberbach last week.

GOVERNOR FOR 25 DAYS.

MAINE EXECUTIVE DIES.

AUGUSTA, Me., Feb. 1.—Governor Edmund G. Parkhurst, of Maine, died Monday of pneumonia, which developed after his apparent recovery from a diphtheritic infection. He had been the chief executive of the state for 25 days, and was the third Maine governor to die in office. He was succeeded as governor by Percival P. Baxter, president of the senate, who took the oath of office late Monday.

Suit for damages was filed by Andrew P. Hamilton against Charles H. Sell, in Wayne circuit court, Tuesday morning. The plaintiff alleges that he was driving east on Main street in an automobile, which was struck by an automobile driven by the defendant, shoving the former car against a lamp post and damaging both the car and the post to the amount of \$231.40. This amount and costs are asked.

Damages amounting to \$10,000 are asked by Everett R. Moore, of Dr. Charles Marvel, in a suit filed in Wayne circuit court Tuesday morning.

Moore alleges that Marvel failed to use ordinary skill and care in setting a broken leg, and that as a result the plaintiff has suffered and is permanently disabled.
