

PREBLE GROWERS MAY ENTER EXHIBITS IN RICHMOND CORN SHOW

EATON, O., Feb. 2.—Among the more prominent persons from a distance in attendance here Tuesday at the sessions of the agricultural short course were F. P. Chaffee, secretary of the Chamber of Commerce, Richmond, Ind., and W. B. Fulghum, chairman of a corn show and community meeting, to be held the first of next week in Richmond. Mr. Chaffee had just assumed his duties as secretary of the Richmond Chamber of Commerce, Tuesday morning. He and Mr. Fulghum were present at the meeting here to boost the Richmond meeting next week. They made extensive distribution of programs and entry blanks for the corn and food show of their homelands. They were especially busy among the exhibitors at the corn show here, which was a feature of the short course. The Richmond show is open to the world, they declared. It is highly probable entries will be received from Preble county, as quite a few persons talked encouragingly about making entries.

**Grant Time Extension.**  
Extension of time, until February 15, has been granted by the county commissioners to owners of dogs in Preble county to secure licenses for their canines. 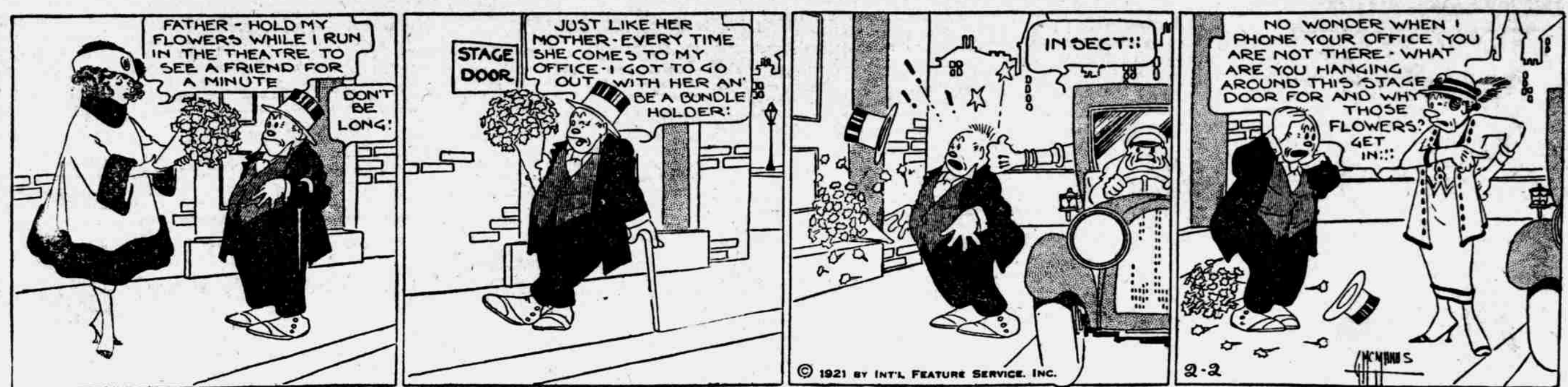
**FISTS FLY IN FIGHT OVER UTAH CIGARETTE MEASURE**
