

GREENVILLE FACTORY RE-OPENS; BUSINESS MAY FORCE ADDITION

GREENVILLE, O., Feb. 2.—The L. R. Marks Coat company, of this city, after being closed down for several months, reopened again with a large force of employees yesterday morning. Walter Riggs, general manager of the concern, stated that the plant will be working one hundred people in the near future, as enough orders are on the books to run the plant full time for six months. Mr. Riggs also stated that should the volume of business continue at the present rate, it will be necessary to enlarge the plant to meet the demand. The majority of the product manufactured is sold in South America and Cuba.

Father Threatens Son.

Delbert Young, 22, farmer, residing with his parents near Pittsburg, in Monroe township, Saturday afternoon swore out a warrant for the arrest of his father, J. B. Young, charging him with threatening to shoot and kill him. He alleged his father carried a shot gun with him the latter part of last week. Sheriff Wagner and Deputy Corwin arrested the elder Young and bail was fixed at \$500. Being unable to pay the amount he was confined in jail until his hearing before Mayor John Wright yesterday afternoon. Delbert Young, the prosecuting witness, failed to put in an appearance at the hearing, and his father was consequently released on parole, in custody of Attorney George Mannix. It is said the charges will be withdrawn.

Refused Marriage License.

Judge Younker yesterday refused a marriage license to a young couple who, it is thought, were trying to "put one over" on the judge. The couple, giving their names as Geo. Redman, 22, birthplace Jay county, Ind., and Cleo Bye, 18, birthplace Jay county, Ind., applied for a marriage license, stating they were residents of Darke county. Upon being questioned, they were unable to tell from what township or village in the county they resided, and could give no references of people who knew them.

Old Suit Comes Up.

The case of Christine Parker, vs. Emmanuel Conrad et al., which was assigned for hearing in common pleas court Tuesday before Judge Teegarden, was postponed until Wednesday. The case, which is an old one, has been up for hearing on three different occasions, but for some reason was postponed each time. The suit was brought to settle the title to a tract of land which was purchased for church purposes and on which the German Baptist church in Jackson township was located. The plaintiff now asserts that she has the title to the land, and her assertion promises to be bitterly contested. Martin B. Trainor represents the plaintiff and Bickel, Baker and Murphy the defendants.

Leaves For Dertot.

Theodore, 15-year-old son of Mr. and Mrs. J. M. Kammons, West Main street, Greenville, has been missing since Saturday afternoon, the efforts of his parents to locate him proving of no avail. The lad left home Saturday afternoon without informing his parents where he was going, and when he did not return for the evening meal a search was started, with no success until yesterday morning, when Mr. Kammons was informed in Dayton that a lad answering the description of the missing boy had purchased a ticket from Dayton to Detroit. An attempt is now being made to locate him in that city. Mr. Kammons, who is a well-known cigar manufacturer of the city, states that there was no reason for the strange disappearance of his son. The Kammon boy had been a Dayton Journal carrier in Greenville for some time past.

Green Funeral Held.

The death of Mrs. Mina Augusta Green, 68, occurred Saturday at the home of her daughter, Mrs. Arthur Brown, near Woodington, this county, due to pneumonia. Mrs. Green, whose husband preceded her in death last spring, is survived by two daughters at whose home Mrs. Green died. The remains were taken to the home of the other daughter, Mrs. Adam Hetsler, at Hillgrove, O., where the funeral services were held Tuesday afternoon, with Rev. Plymate, of the Presbyterian church in this city, officiating. Interment was made in the Greenville cemetery.
