

HISTORICAL SOCIETY OF GREENVILLE WILL MARK WAYNE TRAIL

GREENVILLE, O., Feb. 8.—Messrs. John Brandt, R. P. Mannix, J. H. Myers, German Warner and Jacob Menke were unanimously chosen as members of the Greenville Historical society at a meeting held last Friday night. It was announced at the meeting that more members and more dues are needed to carry on the work of marking Wayne's trail through Darke county, which the society has set out to do.

A part of the evening was devoted to a recital of the war record of Major Charles Slade, commander of the local American legion post. The next regular meeting of the society will be held on March 4.

Flory Pleads Not Guilty.
After being arraigned in common pleas court Saturday afternoon, the trial of Edward E. Flory, indicted by a recent grand jury on a charge of non support, was set for March 8. Flory pleaded not guilty to the charge, and bond was fixed at \$500. Being unable to pay the same, he was committed to the county jail until the date of his trial. Attorney Edwin Wright was appointed by the court to defend Flory.

Two Wives For Soldier.
One of the first cases of its kind to occur in Darke county was brought to light yesterday when H. N. Patten, the government and Ellis Flory, from Washington, D. C., was examining the soldiers records on file in the local probate court. According to Mr. Patten, two women claim to be the wife of an ex-soldier, who is now dead. No names were divulged by the pension examiner.

Conrad's Victor in Suit.
Emmanuel Conrad et al., defendants in a suit tried in common pleas court here last week, were awarded the verdict after the jury had deliberated for two hours. Christine Parker, the plaintiff, asserted that she had a clear title to a tract of ground in Jackson township, on which the German Baptist church was formerly situated, and the case was up in court for four days, the verdict being awarded late Saturday afternoon.

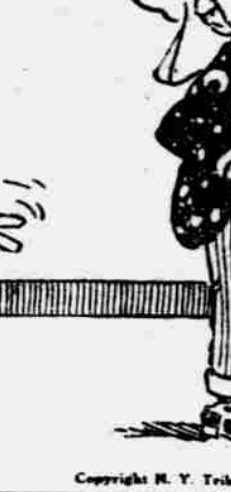

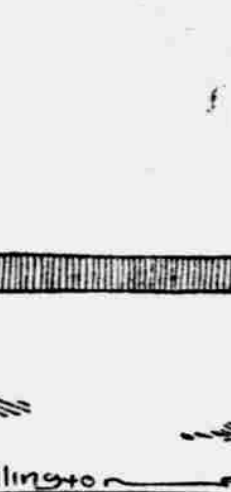
