PROPOSE MEASURE  
TO AVERT BRIBING

(By Associated Press)

SPRINGFIELD, Ill., Feb. 9.—Representative Norman G. Flagg of Madison county, who says he is "not even a baseball fan," wants the Illinois legislature to pronounce the bribing of a baseball player or director a felonious act on the part of both the briber and the one receiving the bribe.

Mr. Flagg had before the assembly today a bill the preamble of which read: "A bill for an act to make a felony in the baseball profession a felony."

The Madison county representative said he copied the bill from the measure recently introduced in the Missouri legislature and he understood it to be in accord with the desires of the National commission.

Mr. Flagg's bill specifies "any player or employee," and says that bribery consists of the giving of "any money, property or other thing of value."
