

PASSING OF BILL BY OHIO SENATE SHOWS NEW POLICY ADOPTION

COLUMBUS, O., Feb. 11.—Repeal of the long-established anti-trust law of Ohio in so far as it applies to farmers, dairymen, stock raisers, gardeners and fruit raisers, is a half accomplished fact, and the state has entered upon a new policy of legislation.

These things were brought about through the adoption Friday, without a dissenting vote, by the Ohio senate of the bill of Senator Charles Brand, of Champaign county, representative of the dairy organizations of Central Ohio, which was backed by farming interests generally.

When ratified by the house of representatives, an expected performance, these producers will be enabled to form corporations or associations, with or without capital stock, and be authorized to earn dividends not in excess of eight percent. These organizations are to be charged with having a public interest by the proposed law and be made subject to regulation by the state public utility commission.

Tax Measures Reported. In the house of representatives the three important taxation measures, two bills and one constitutional proposal, bearing on tax rates and indebtedness limitations, formally were reported from the taxation committee and made public utility commission for Wednesday afternoon, and at the same time ordered them reprinted with all amendments as speedily as possible that they may be studied by affected interests. There came a formal report, too, on the hard-fought Harding state constitutional bill, which was a special order for 2 o'clock Wednesday afternoon for final action.

New Tax Bills. New taxation bills saw the light of day in both branches. Representative Harry D. Silver, of Preble, to whom fell the honor of introducing the new liberal constitutional proposal on taxation, introduced the bill to exempt from taxation the evidences of indebtedness obtained by real estate mortgages and substituting therefor a filing fee of one half of one percent, the tax also to be collected again at each yearly period on the balance remaining undischarged.

This bill is to go to the taxation committee for a slumber of indefinite period, and only to be pushed in event of the failure of the fundamental change through any cause. Silver's bill is predicated upon the so-called Shinn amendment, adopted in 1918.

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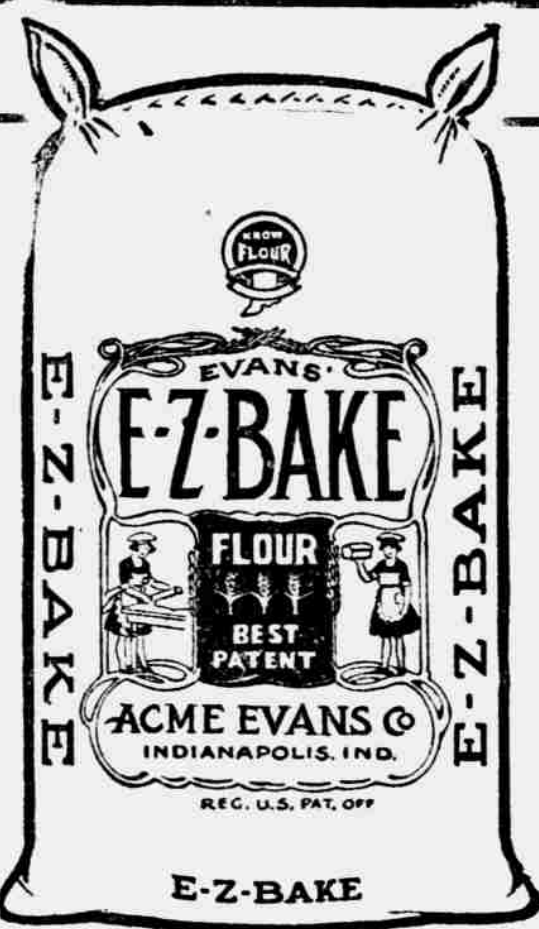
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
