WINCHESTER, Ind., Feb. 16.—In the case of the state of Indiana vs. the school board of Union City, Judge A. L. Bales Tuesday ruled in favor of the school board. The case was filed in December after the school board refused to enforce a vaccination order issued by the Randolph county board of health. F. S. Caldwell and G. H. Ward legally represented the school board.

Kizer Will Probated.
The will of William D. Kizer has been filed for probate. He bequeaths to his sister, Clara Alice Ross, in fee simple, his home property and all furnishings therein and \$5,000 in cash. To the trustees of Fountain Park cemetery, he leaves \$100, the interest derived therefrom to be expended for suitable flowers and for the care of the lots of his father.

the sum of \$500,000 to each of his nieces and nephews, Florence O'Hara, Agnes K. Ross, Beatrice M. Kizer, Thomas Carlton Kizer and Homer T. Kizer. \$500 to the Hetty Vorlus home for aged women, and \$500 to the W. E. Miller Memorial hospital, providing a building be erected and equipped within five years. All other property belonging to his estate, he wishes to be converted into cash, bonds, stocks or well-secured promissory notes, after which the same is to be divided between his sisters and brothers, Emma O'Hara, Clara Alice Ross, Frank W. Kizer, Thomas J. Kizer and Edward B. Kizer. He nominates the Farmers and Merchants' Bank executor of the will. The will was written May 25, 1918 and was witnessed by Philip Kabel and S. M. Timmons. The bequest to the Hetty Vorlus home for aged women and the W. E. Miller Memorial Hospital, cannot be paid, for the reason, that the Hetty Vorlus Home has been converted into the Randolph County Hospital, and the W. E. Miller Memorial Hospital was not erected. The two bequests will probably all go to the Randolph county hospital.
