

FORMER ARISTOCRACY OF RUSSIA SERVES AT MENIAL TASKS

WARSAW, March 2.—Driven from palace to hovel, some of the members of the aristocracy of old Russia are now peeling potatoes or chopping wood for a living.

Five thousand men, women and children, some of whose resounding titles once brought homage of courtiers, are clustered here, after having fled to Poland before the Bolsheviks. Helping them to help themselves is Madame Ludmilla Lubinoff, herself a refugee, though born a princess of one of the oldest Russian houses, and the wife of a former civil governor of Warsaw.

Active in Charity Work.
This remarkable woman is conducting soup kitchens, sewing rooms and workshops for members of her unhappy class and taking orders from her men who once commanded the armed forces of the Russian emperor. On her staff are admirals, generals, governors, mayors and members of the old Petrograd court, while her husband has laid aside his gubernatorial duties to become her secretary.

A beautiful woman, she hides the tragedy of her life under an optimism that is an example to the unhappy folk to whom she ministers. A woman of action, too, for she escaped from Petrograd with her two sons after freeing her husband from the fortress of Peter and Paul, and arming him with a fictitious passport that enabled him to flee to Warsaw. Here the family was reunited.

Selling virtually all she possessed to aid her fellow-countrymen, Mrs. Lubinoff organized the Warsaw branch of the Russian Red Cross, which is being aided by the American organization.

Unsparring as a Worker.
Sparing not herself, Madame Lubinoff has not spared the colony of refugees which included many of the former Russian nobility. In the soup kitchen and wood yard which she has established in a Russian orthodox church at 5 Podwal—a squalid property placed at her disposal—are working men and women of title at tasks which servants once performed for them.

In the dingy little courtyard, General Obolonsky, formerly architect at the Russian court, chops wood for a living with several officers of the crack imperial guards, one of whom, has lost his reason and must be watched. In a small and dirty building, Prince Meschersky, who was master of ceremonies at the imperial court, peels potatoes for his daily bread.

Indiana Brevities

WABASH.—A gas pocket which oil men say will provide 1,000,000 feet of gas a day, was opened Tuesday on the Abner Crowe farm, southwest of LaFontaine. The pocket was opened when drillers were attempting to locate oil and those who are in control of the fields in the southern part of the county plan to pipe the gas to Marion, LaFontaine, Hartford City and nearby cities.

BRAZIL.—John J. Luther, living near Clay City, is in a serious condition as a result of injuries received Tuesday when his home was destroyed by fire. He had been sitting up with his father, who is ill, and upon returning home, slept so soundly he was unaware his house was burning until the roof fell in on him. His family is visiting in Terre Haute.

EVANSVILLE.—One hundred and fifty men employed by the Indiana T. Co. here went on a strike Tuesday as the result of an alleged attempt to reduce their wages for handling ties. The men have been getting two and one-half cents a tie and it is understood the company wanted to reduce the price to one and one-half cents a tie.

DEATH DANCE AMONG SYMPHONY NUMBERS

Included in the numbers to be given by the Richmond Symphony orchestra at its concert on March 14, is Saint-Saens symphonic poem "Danse Macabre." In the pursuit of knowledge there is often no end to the controversy, as for instance, the etymology of the word "macabre" is most obscure. We read that some antiquaries suppose that the name "macabre" is derived from St. Macarius who is a prominent figure in Orcagna's "Triumph of Death," painted upon the walls of the Campo Santo at Pisa, about 1350, and who was also portrayed in a number of pictures upon the subject of Death.

Others derive it from the Arabic "macbourah," a cemetery, while among other suppositions regarding its origin, some antiquaries derive the word from an early German poet by the name of Macabre, who was the author of a work entitled the "Dance of Death," or the "Dance of Macabre," consisting of a series of dialogues between Death and a number of personages belonging to various ranks of society. But whatever its derivation, the word "macabre" is, according to the encyclopedia, "a term applied to a certain type of artistic or literary composition, characterized by a grim and ghastly humor, with an insistence on the details and trappings of death." The word has gained its significance from its use in French, "la danse macabre," for that allegorical representation in painting, sculpture and tapestry, of the ever-present and universal power of death, known in English as the "Dance of Death" and in German as "Totentanz."

Naturally, the world-famous symphonic poem by Saint-Saens associates itself in one's mind with Holbein's "Dance of Death." The entire series of these woodcuts, fifty-three in number, were published in book form at Bale, in 1554, under the title "Simulachres de la Mort, Icones Mortis," that is in French and Latin, "Images of Death"—for the title "Dance of Death" is of recent origin.

Richard Grant White says of Holbein's "Dance of Death," that "Great as we think our advancement in the arts has been—the mechanical part of them, at least—all the efforts of the lithographer, the wood-cutter, and even

the line-engraver, to reproduce the spirit or the very lines of this work, have been but partially successful." This great work, White further says, has caused all others to be forgotten, except by antiquaries, for Holbein's pre-eminence over all the other representations of the same subject consists in his groups being instinct with life, character and emotion, which in other "Dances of Death" are but a dull and formal succession of figures. Holbein's "Death," although but a mere skeleton "sat to a painter who not only added to the truthfulness of his portrait the charm of poetic feeling, but the magic touch of whose pencil made his dry bones live."

GERMAN AGRICULTURE HANDICAPPED BY LACK OF HORSES; USE COWS

CHICAGO, Ill., March 2.—Lack of horses in Germany is seriously handicapping agriculture in that country, according to P. M. Chappel, just returned to this country after spending four months visiting agricultural leaders in Germany and observing conditions there.

"Agriculture in Germany is in a bad way, simply because they have no horses. Heavy losses in the war and practical discontinuance of breeding in order to save food, has destroyed the work stock almost entirely. "Even if there were horses, few would have money to buy them. Many are working by hand,—turning over the sod with spades—men, women, boys and girls. Others fortunate enough to have plows hitch on what ever live stock they have, a cow and a horse, a cow and a yearling, a cow and a mule—some of the queerest combinations I ever laid eyes on. These conditions are not local; they're general. A man plowing with a cow hitched to his implement and his woman leading the cow. Harnesses of rope or anything that will hold together. Fortunately

indeed is the man with a good yoke of oxen. "In Berlin, 90 per cent of the horses were small Russian ponies, weighing about 750 pounds. Few motors, but these little ponies for everything—trucking, delivering, even couples and carriages. Gasoline is very high—it was something like 80 cents a gallon when I was there. Leading agricultural economists in Berlin state their census surveys indicated need for a half million mares—but they have no gold and few American dealers are willing to sell them breeding stock on long time credits."

APPOINT EPISCOPAL COMMITTEE TONIGHT

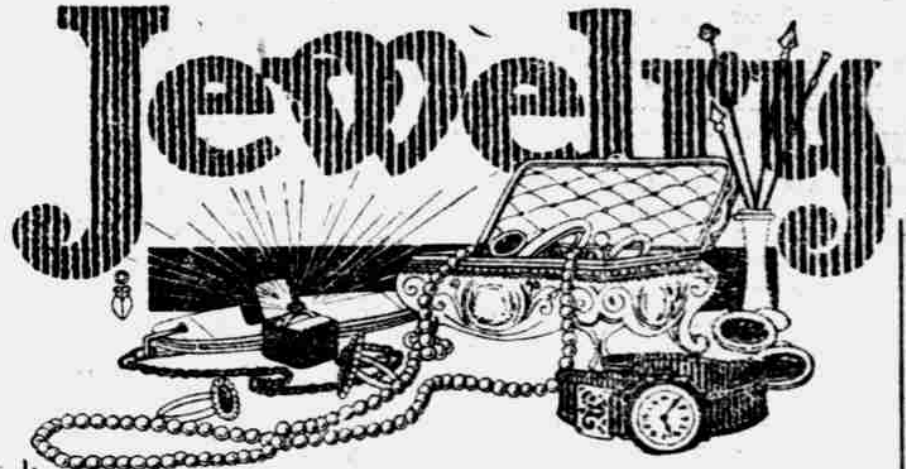
