

## ANSONIA LIGHT CASE NEARS SETTLEMENT IN LATEST DECISION

GREENVILLE, March 3.—Another step toward solution of the Ansonia light tangle was taken when Judge Jones, of Troy, before whom a case had been in progress in common pleas court, decided that the Ansonia village authorities were within their rights when they brought condemnation proceedings in probate court here against the Ansonia Light company. The village last year issued bonds for the erection of a municipal light plant, and after the erection of same, brought suit before Probate Judge Younker to condemn the poles, plant, wires, etc., of the Ansonia Light company, an organization which had up to that time been furnishing the village residents with light.

Before the condemnation case could be heard, the Ansonia Light company filed petition for an injunction, which was granted by Judge George W. Mannix, Jr. Judge Jones' decision automatically dissolves the temporary injunction allowed by Judge Mannix, and plans to push the condemnation proceedings are being made by the village authorities.

**Tobacco Suit Dismissed.**  
The case of J. E. Brown Leaf Tobacco company vs. J. S. Hoke, which was to have been heard before Judge Teegarden in common pleas court here was settled and dismissed. The action was brought following some trouble over a tobacco deal, in which Brown alleged that Hoke owed him \$270 and interest at 8 percent from March 15, 1918.

One of the largest consignments of tobacco ever delivered to Greenville was made yesterday at the Cain Warehouse on Thirteenth street. The tobacco was consigned to Newburg and Co., of Hamilton, and consisted of 660 cases.

The price paid was 15 cents a pound, totaling in the neighborhood of \$33,000 for the entire consignment. The tobacco was purchased by Charles Baughman, of Ansonia. Mr. Baughman will also receive a crop of tobacco at Ansonia today and one at Union City tomorrow.

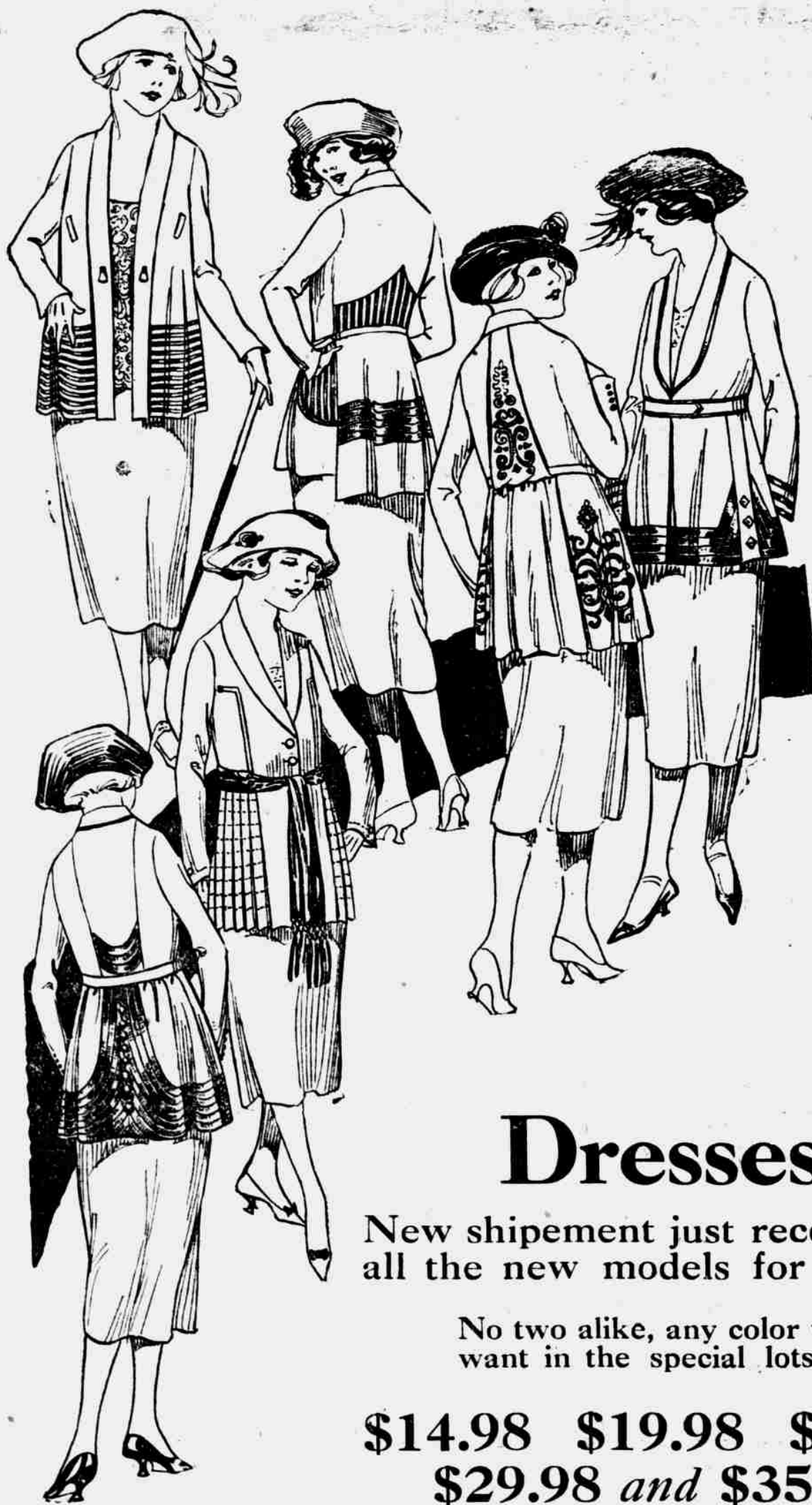
